



What is a Lord's Acre Festival?

In 1930, the Lord's Acre idea began in western North Carolina as a means of raising funds for small country churches. A portion or "acre" of a church member's land was set aside to raise crops to be sold to benefit the church. Even livestock was dedicated. Those without land could set aside a portion of their needlework, craft items, or any other saleable talent they possessed. The Lord's Acre Festival is a sale of those donations.

Salem's Lord's Acre Festival, which began in 1960, was first held in the old Wolfsville School where Salem's parsonage now stands. In 1970, the festival was moved to the Wolfsville Ruritan Park where it has grown to what it is today. This year will be our 54th Lord's Acre. Lord's Acre profits go to Salem's Building and Improvement Fund.

Since its debut in 1960, the profits from Salem's Lord's Acre Festival have made possible many major building projects, such as the educational building (1967), parsonage (1974-75), and parking lot.

The Lord's Acre is an important fund-raiser for the church. In recent years, profits have enabled numerous improvements and maintenance projects:

2010 - All windows were replaced in the educational building and parsonage. Also, some exterior aluminum facia was added to the parsonage as well as new spouting and downspouts.

2011 - Stucco was replaced on the north and east sides of the exterior church

Would you help us advertise the Lord's Acre?

Someone once said the best advertising is "word of mouth." A personal invitation to a friend or neighbor is best. This eliminates the chance that they might not see our ads and articles in the newspapers; or hear our public service announcements on the radio; or see our posters in store-front windows; or see our postings on Salem's website and Facebook page; or see our road signs at local intersections.

Posters are available at church. You may wish to place a poster on the bulletin board where you work.

Due to rigorous postal service bulk mail procedures, we are not mailing post cards again this year.

Some of our faithful patrons will likely remember that the Lord's Acre is always on the second Saturday in September, which is September 14th this year. But in case they forget, be their reminder.

walls. Painted window frames on the exterior of church buildings and other exterior wood surfaces, painted utility buildings, and replaced the wooden cross on the front of the main building.

2012 - Shelving was installed in parsonage basement; tankless water heater installed in educational building; replaced kitchen sink and faucet in church kitchen; and replaced two window air conditioners.

2013 - Central air and insulation was installed in parsonage; repaired parsonage drainage; and restriped the parking lots.

CROP Hunger Walk set for September 22

he Wolfsville/Myersville CROP Hunger Walk is scheduled for Sunday, September 22 at 1:30 p.m., beginning at Salem United Methodist Church in Wolfsville. Registration for the 5-mile walk along country roads begins at 1:00 p.m.

What is a CROP Hunger Walk? It is a team of people coming together to raise funds to stop hunger and poverty here in our community and in more than 80 other countries around the world through Church World Service (CWS).

CROP means Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty. Twenty-five percent of the walk proceeds will be given locally to the Middletown Food Bank, Salem UMC Food Pantry and the Frederick County Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs.

What do CROP walkers do? Each walker obtains sponsors for the miles walked and collects these funds either before or after the walk. By walking with others in more than 2000 towns and cities in the U.S., they help villages throughout the world have safe, clean wells near their homes.


They help more than 3,200 local food pantries, food banks and meal sites in the U.S. to provide food to neighbors in need. They help share tools of hope in the wake of natural disasters around the globe. They help provide seeds, tools, blankets, chicks, tents, school supplies, education, job training and health for-

mulas to developing nations, refugees and disaster victims where needed.

Last year, 60 walkers from 5 different churches raised \$4,707 in the Wolfsville/Myersville CROP Walk for Hunger. Of this amount, Salem's Food Pantry received \$392.09 from CWS/CROP.


Many of us have deep roots in our community and feel a deep sense of dedication toward our church and its ministry in the Wolfsville area.




Newsletter Distribution





ate August-early September always feels to me more like the start of the new calendar year than does January 1. I realize this may not be true for everyone, but I believe there are many who share this feeling. During this time of year there is a major shift for many: our tasks increase in number, our pace of life increases, and our priorities change. Just at the church, these are some of the things that are happening:

• Both children and adults have returned back to school, extracurricular activities are starting, and schedules are changing.

On Sept. 8, we're beginning an eightweek sermon series, "The Power of Prayer."
We're reorganizing Hero's Club and searching for a person to fill the part-time,

paid Hero's Club Leader staff position.
The Middle and High School Faith Builders Youth Group has started its weekly Thursday night gatherings again for another school year.

• The Nominating and Leadership Development Committee will begin to meet August 27 to nominate church leaders for 2014.

• The Staff Parish Relations Committee will be meeting soon to review the pastor's salary and conduct performance reviews for church staff.

• Lord's Acre is around the corner on September 14th; with CROP Walk right behind it on September 22nd.

• Charge Conference forms are being completed, a major administrative undertaking each year at this time.

• Efforts are underway to move the church website to a new hosting site by September 30.

• And there are the ongoing work tasks of the church to be performed along with tasks and events in our personal lives, both planned and unplanned.

You have your own list of things that are happening this time of year. It's easy for you and me to get swept away with all of this, reacting to the next task or event and allowing our priorities to get made for us hoping to just "keep our heads above water." I encourage us (myself included!) to avoid that temptation to be

swept along. How? - By taking the time to stay very close to God. You might say, "Take the time, that's nuts. Having no time is already the problem and you want us to somehow find more time?" Yes, that's exactly what I'm encouraging because it's God who can best help us keep our priorities straight and help us get done the things that really need to get accomplished and maybe even let go of some things. All else falls into its proper place when we keep God our first priority and when we stay close to God throughout the day.

How do we do that? I believe we can do it through prayer. Over the next few weeks let's really focus on prayer. Let's study it and practice it. Let's share with one another how it's going – what seems to be working and what's not. Let's work with God and support one another in our prayer lives. To help, a sermon series called, "The Power of Prayer" is being offered beginning Sep. 8. Here are some highlights. God Bless each of you! —*Pastor Bob*

September 1 – Holy Communion Luke 14:1, 7-14

"Jesus at a Pharisee's House"

The end of verse 1, referring to Jesus, says "...he was being carefully watched." The religious leaders, feeling threatened by Jesus, were watching him closely trying to catch him at doing something wrong so they could bring him up on charges, or at least discredit him. Jesus knew they were watching closely. They wished to catch him but he beat them at their own game. He did so by merely speaking the truth in love.

The Pharisees wanted others to see how religious they were in order to bring praise upon themselves. But Jesus taught: strive to do the right thing as God sees right and in doing so seek not to be noticed by others. The Pharisees sought out each other's company and praise. But Jesus taught: serve those in need and you'll receive God's praise. Jesus seeks to point us to God and the ways of God because that is ultimately what gives meaning to our lives here on earth.

September 8 The Power of Prayer -

"The State of Our Prayer Life"

How is it with our prayer? What

could be more important than staying close to God? Prayer is the key. We have our "to do" lists. We keep them in our heads and we put them on paper or keep them electronically. Those lists record all that is important to us during the day - tasks to be accomplished, errands to run, people to contact. We maintain calendars with all our upcoming meetings and events. The Power of Prayer - "To Whom Do We Pray? (You May be Surprised)"




