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Salem to present inspiring worship topics during Lent: *Final Words from the Cross*

his year, Lent begins in February, with Ash Wednesday on February 13th. The following seven Sundays, Pastor Bob will present a series by Rev. Adam Hamilton titled *Final Words from the Cross*.

Two years ago, during Lent, the Salem congregation was blessed by Rev. Adam Hamilton's worship series titled, "24 Hours That Changed the World." During that experience, Adam Hamilton took us on a Lenten journey through the last day of Jesus' life.

This year, through a video presentation each Sunday, Rev. Hamilton examines Christ's dying hours and his final words as seen and heard through the eyes and ears of those who stood near the cross.

Then, on Easter Sunday, Rev. Hamilton will conclude the series by moving beyond the cross to Jesus' words to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and to those who were witnesses to the resurrection. The schedule of topics are:

Sun Mar 10 - Today You Will Be with Me in Paradise


Sun Mar 17 - I Thirst

Food Pantry Update

n November, Salem's Food Pantry became a member of the Maryland Food Bank—Western Branch. Since 1987, this organization has provided charitable organizations with food and other items for their feeding programs. This past year they distributed almost 1.5 million pounds through their partner agencies and touched the lives of over 2,000 families each month. The Maryland Food Bank mission is to lead the movement and nurture the belief, that together, they can improve the lives of all Marylanders by ending hunger. Last year, the Maryland Food Bank distributed more than 26.1 million pounds of food to a network of 600 soup kitchens, pantries and shelters across the state.

As a member, we are offered discounted food to make our money go farther. For example, we can order 12 boxes (18 oz.) of Corn Flakes for \$1.32 a box, 24 cans of chicken at 73 cents each, 24 boxes

of Mac & Cheese for 39 cents each. Then, we can purchase what they call salvage items that are from local grocery stores like Wegman's/Food Lion; like 24 (16 oz.) fruit drinks for \$4.06, making each item costing 17 cents each.

It was like Christmas for Nancy Ferguson and me, when we opened the purchased items. We ordered a box of coffee, tea, sugar, hot cocoa for \$4.00. Inside the box were 5 cans of coffee, 6 boxes of tea and an assortment of hot drinks, which you know at the grocery store you cannot get coffee less than \$7 for a small can. So, becoming a member and taking advantage of the low costs, our money will go farther to help feed the 30 families that come to our pantry.

Mt. Bethel United Methodist Church collects monthly for our pantry. They so much believe in what we are doing, they are making our Food Pantry a Mission Project. The Ruritan Club gives us monetary donations and recently gave us a case (96 rolls) of toilet paper. God is so good to lay on the hearts of many that want to

help our hungry families.

Sun. March 3, after a.m. services

I must share one of the many Godsigns that I see weekly at our pantry. A new family that started coming in December shared with me that the husband and wife both lost their jobs before December. They are struggling financially so they told their son that there would not be a Christmas this year. It weighed so heavy on my heart during the holidays and I kept praying for that family and others. A week after New Year's, the mother came in and shared with me that even though they did not have the Christmas that they were accustomed to, they both had found a job and their son was so understanding of not receiving presents at Christmas, that they were so humbled by the experience.

So THANK YOU for your monetary donations, prayers, and food donations—together we can help to end hunger in our community!


February is the bridge

RECIPE



RASPBERRY-ALMOND SHORTBREAD COOKIES

Prep: 30 minutes Chill: 1 hour Bake: 10 minutes per batch Cool: 1 minute per batch Oven: 350 degrees

1 cup butter, softened
2/3 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup seedless red raspberry jam

Coarse sugar
1 cup powdered sugar
2 to 3 teaspoons water
1 1/2 teaspoons almond extract

- 1. In a medium bowl, beat butter with an electric mixer on medium to high speed for 30 seconds. Add the granulated sugar and the 1/2 teaspoon almond extract. Beat until combined. Beat in as much flour as you can with the mixer. Using a wooden spoon, stir in remaining flour. Cover; chill 1 hour or until dough is easy to handle.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place balls 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Using your thumb, press an indentation into the center of each ball. Spoon about 1/2 teaspoon of the jam into each indentation. Sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake about 10 minutes or until edges are light brown. Cool on cookie sheets for 1 minute. Transfer to wire racks; cool.
- 3. Meanwhile, for icing, in a medium bowl combine powdered sugar, 1 teaspoon of the water, and the 1 1/2 teaspoons almond extract. Add enough of the remaining water to make drizzling consistency. Drizzle cookies with icing. Makes about 36 cookies.

To Store: Layer cookies between sheets of waxed paper in an airtight container; cover. Store in the refrigerator for up to 3 days or freeze for up to 3 months.

Pastor's Notes — ...Worship in February

uring the first two weeks in February, we'll complete the sermon series we began on January 27, "The Journey to Acceptance." Then on February 13th, Ash Wednesday, we'll once again begin the season of Lent. This year's Lenten sermon series is based on Adam Hamilton's book, *Final Words from the Cross*.

Beginning on February 17th and continuing each Sunday during Lent, we will explore one of the seven last words spoken by Jesus on the cross and the application those words have in our everyday lives today.

Starting on Sunday, February 24, from 6:00-7:15 p.m., a four-week Bible Study on the *Final Words from the Cross* provides an opportunity for more indepth study, discussion, and Christian fellowship.

Lent is a wonderful opportunity each year for asking the questions, "Where am I in my relationship with Christ?" and "Where do I need to go from here?"

I pray this year's Sunday sermon series and Bible Study during Lent will help each of us answer those important questions.


Sermon Series "The Journey to Acceptance" February 3 – Holy Communion "I was helped" John 9

God sees us during the difficult times in our lives and offers help. In John Chapter 9, "Jesus saw a man blind from birth" (9:1) and healed him.

Sometimes God helps through direct intervention; many times God's help flows through other people. We open the door to God's help when we are willing to help ourselves, ask for help, and give help to others in need.

I can't get started on the journey to acceptance if I'm not willing to help myself. I can only go so far on the journey alone, without any help from others, and I can't reach acceptance if I'm not willing to stop at times on my journey to help others.





Sermon Series "The Journey to Acceptance" February 10 – Transfiguration Sunday "I was accepted" Luke 17:11-17

Luke 9:28-36 tells of Jesus' transfiguration. "As he [Jesus] was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning" (9:29). "A voice came from the cloud, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him."

On Transfiguration Sunday we hear these words and think back to God's words spoken at Jesus' baptism, "And a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased'" (Luke 3:22b). True acceptance only comes when we bow down to the source of all true love and help: Christ our Lord and Savier

In Luke 17, Jesus helps ten lepers. He heals all ten, but only one returns to praise God: "He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him — and he was a Samaritan" (17:16).

Sermon Series
"Final Words from the Cross"
February 17 – First Sunday in Lent
"Father Forgive Them"
Luke 23:34

The four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) relate the last words of Jesus from the cross. No one Gospel contains all of them. As we've said before, it takes all four Gospels to tell the full story of the life of Jesus.

When Jesus spoke the last words he would ever speak, several groups were there to hear him: his mother and other women who had followed him, perhaps John one of the Apostles, the religious leaders, the Roman soldiers, and the two other men being crucified with him.

When Jesus said, "Father forgive them," some hearts were broken, some were made even harder, but before it was all over some were changed. A Roman soldier, witnessing all that had happened, confessed "Truly this man was God's Son!" Had we been there, would we have confessed Christ as the Son of God? Do we confess it now with all our heart, and soul, and mind? Do we live our lives with him as Lord?

Sermon Series "Final Words from the Cross" February 24 – Second Sunday of Lent "Behold Your Son...

Behold Your Mother" John 19:26

Can you imagine Mary's sorrow? Thirty some years earlier, when she and Joseph took their baby to be presented in the temple, Simeon said to Mary, "a sword will pierce your own soul too." How sorrowful must Mary's piercing been to see her son falsely accused, humiliated, brutally beaten, and now tortured on the cross?

With all the sins of humanity pushing down upon him on the cross, Jesus is still caring for individual people. He first turns to his mom and says, "Behold your Son" – (Mom, I love you. John will take care of you from now on mom, don't be afraid.) Then he turned to John and said, "Behold your Mother" – (I still love you John no matter what and I choose you to take care of my mother for me.)

In the same way, Jesus calls out from the cross to each one of us, "I love you, don't be afraid, I have good work for you to do in my kingdom."


