





The food, like that served at the Lord's Acre Festival, is back! The Bee-lievers are planning two food sales in March.

A soup and sandwich sale is planned for pick-ups on March 10 and 11. Those order forms were due February 26; you may call me at 301-293-2436, if you need to place an order.

Orders are being taken for a pie sale with pick-ups on March 24 and 25. An order form appears at right, and is due March 11. If you can't deliver a form in person, call me as above.

BUSY SPRING AHEAD FOR BEE-LIEVERS

In addition to the March food sales, the Bee-lievers will have a food sale at the upcoming plant and yard sale on May 12.

Another project of the Bee-lievers and women of the church is providing meals for the Wolfsville Ruritan Club's monthly meeting. When the Ruritan Club was formed 55 years ago, Salem and St. Mark's Lutheran Church were offered the opportunity to provide meals for the meetings, in return for a donation from the club. Salem provides the supper on the third Monday in February, April, June and October. We can always use help with preparation, serving and clean-up, if anyone has some time to donate. This has been a steady source of income for the women through the years.

A new project for the Bee-lievers is the prayer shawl ministry. At our next meeting on March 1, we will be making fleece prayer shawls for distribution to those in need of comfort and solace. Patterns are also available for anyone who would like to knit or crochet a shawl.

The Bee-lievers is a group of women who usually meet on the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. in the church social area. There is no business meeting in May due to Ladies Night Out (more about that in the April newsletter!).

The group works to support the missions of the church, with a lot of effort being put into fund-raising and crafting for the Lord's Acre project. Any woman is invited to just show up at a meeting. We have a brief devotion, a business meeting, sometimes a work session, and a time for fellowship and refreshments.

Salem's Bee-lievers has started a prayer shawl ministry. Prayer shawls have been made for centuries, going back to Biblical times, and are symbolic of an inclusive, unconditionally loving God. These shawls are to be wrapped around a person giving them the feeling of God's loving arms embracing them. They wrap, enfold, comfort, cover, give solace, hug, shelter and beautify.

This ministry will be for those in celebration of a birth of a child, wedding, renewal of vows, accomplishment, or an ill child, adult or someone going into surgery or dying. We also have beautiful crosses that can be held in hand or hung as a reminder of God's love. Those who have received these shawls or crosses have been uplifted and affirmed, as if given wings to fly above their troubles.

If you would like to help by using your talents in knitting, crocheting or sewing of these garments, we would greatly appreciate your participation. 

ent is a time of self-examination, recommitment, and renewal. We ask ourselves the questions: Where am I falling short? Where do I want to be? How do I get there? The 40 days of Lent are a great opportunity to work with God to answer those questions.

During Lent this year, our sermon series is "A Journey to Hope." On Ash Wednesday, we started the journey. We saw that any journey worth taking involves some risk. If we can risk going outside of our comfort zones we'll continue to grow in faith, but if we're not willing to risk at all, we'll remain right where we are.

On Ash Wednesday and again this past Sunday, we were challenged to take the risk of asking a person in our congregation to be our traveling partners on our journey to hope. I really encourage you to do that now, if you haven't done so already.

As we journey together, the topics we address each week are things most of us wrestle with: relationships, self-esteem, work, temptation, money, and suffering. Maybe you are experiencing a problem in one or more of those areas right now? Maybe you could use a sounding board? Maybe you need support holding yourself accountable? Maybe you could use some care as you heal physically or emotionally? We could all use the encouragement and support a traveling partner can offer. A thriving, healthy community of faith extends that kind of love and support to one another. Asking someone to be our traveling partner, saying "yes" to be a partner, and staying closer to God than we ever have before — those three things are going to set us up for a great "journey to hope" this Lent. March 4th – "A Journey to Hope" Lenten Sermon Series Week 3 - "Self-Esteem" Mark 11:1-11

his self-esteem to be dictated by those who wished him harm. Identity and self-esteem can make or break our journey. Is our identity based on who people say we are? Or is our identity based upon who we know God created us to be? Having a firm foundation of who we are, helps us overcome the obstacles of life.

March 11th – "A Journey to Hope" Lenten Sermon Series Week 4 - "Work" Mark 10:35-44

James and John asked Jesus if they could have the highest places of honor with Jesus, one on his right and one on his left. They felt they had worked for this and deserved it. What do we work for? We need to meet our financial needs along our journey. How can work be realized as joyful? The disciples gave up all their things to live out their passion for Christ. Many of us give up all our passions to have our possessions. How can we find the right balance that is pleasing to God?

March 18th - "A Journey of Hope" Lenten Sermon Series Week 5 – "Temptation" Mark 14:32-40

The thought of what awaited him exhausted Jesus — ridicule, suffering, painful execution. When we get tired along the way, it is tempting to stop or turn away from the journey. To go the distance, we must learn to refuel. Prayer (personal and as a community) is a way to build strength. Christ is our model for this; he frequently turned to prayer.

March 25th – "A Journey to Hope" Lenten Sermon Series Week 6 - "Money" Mark 12:41-44

The Bible says that the poor widow in this story "put more into the treasury than all the others" (vs. 43). She figured out the significance of Christ in her life and gave accordingly. Money is a means of exchange for something we need or want. Any journey requires purchases along the way. Do we have a healthy relationship with money? Do we have money or does money have us?

Wednesdays during Lent Individual Prayer and Meditation Stations of the Cross

The sanctuary will be available each Wednesday evening from 7-8 p.m. during Lent for individual prayer and meditation. Prayer and meditation is available in the pews, and at the Stations of the Cross which will be set up in the windows of the sanctuary. During this hour, Pastor Bob or a lay member of the church will be available for prayer.

PRAYER FOR LENT

Gracious and merciful God, I thank you for a special time of year that reminds me of how much I need you and how available you are for my need.

Help me, dear Lord, to make the days until Easter a time of turning to you, opening my heart to you, confessing my sin to you, and relying on your grace.


We were asked to bring our favorite Bible verse to put inside of a Blessing Basket that will be given to the moms of Hero's Club children.


