The trustees have been doing normal repairs and assisting wherever we can.

Parsonage

Bobby Fogle recently replaced the microwave in the parsonage and Brandon Leatherman is working on installing a sump-pump in the parsonage as a backup in case we have another bad storm come through. The tile floor in the parsonage kitchen is breaking and coming loose. Samples have been received and once selection is made, Mark Draper will complete the work of replacing them.

We are also thinking of ways to help save the church money, and so we had John Barr from Ellsworth Electric come out, do an evaluation, and give us an estimate on improving the insulation in the parsonage. This was done to the church last year and we understand the savings on heat and air conditioning has been significant. Before we decide whether to move forward with insulation, we are also obtaining at least three estimates for possibly installing a heat pump (for heat

and air conditioning) in the parsonage. The electric heat we now have is very costly, so we thought we should explore other options.

Cemetery

We recently met with Dick Kline and asked him to assist with trying to put the records of the "old cemetery," as well as the new cemetery, in some type of computer program; in hopes that family members or others will be able to see who is buried on any specific lot.

Holy Saturday Prayer Vigil March 30, 2013

12 Noon to 12 Midnight

For over 25 years, starting during the pastorate of Rev. Ron Ellis, Salem has conducted a prayer vigil on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter.

Holy Saturday stands between Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Day. For Jesus' followers, it had to be a time of grieving, fear, and uncertainty. Jesus had not yet risen. Jesus had not yet appeared to them to provide the hope they desperately needed. We know something now on the night before Easter that those who were witnesses to Jesus' death did not know on their night before Easter – Jesus is resurrected from the dead!

Our annual prayer vigil gives us an opportunity to pause in our busy lives and dedicate time to praise God for the gifts of Christ's life, death, resurrection, and the coming of the Holy Spirit and the church. Through Christ's life, we come to know who God is, what God is like, and how we are to live. Through Christ's death our sins are forgiven and we are saved. Through Christ's resurrection we are offered eternal life. And through the coming of the Holy Spirit and the church, Christ continues to live with us to help us make our journey through life. These are extraordinary gifts! Our prayer vigil on Easter Eve is sacred time to pause in our busy lives and give thanks and praise to God for all of this.

20 YEARS AGO...

MARCH 1993 — South Carolina Evangelist Rev. James Hord conducted the Wolfsville United Methodist Evangelistic Crusade, March 14-19, 1993. The six-day crusade, Sunday through Friday evenings, was hosted by Garfield Church (Sunday & Monday), Pleasant Walk (Tuesday & Wednesday), and Salem (Thursday & Friday). A Crusade Choir was assembled from all three churches.

Rev. Hord traveled to Wolfsville in his motor home, parked it on the Salem parking lot, and connected to parsonage water and electricity. Unfortunately, a massive March snowstorm forced a power outage and the cancellation of Sunday morning and evening services, and contributed to the smaller than normal attendance during the weeknight services. Nevertheless, "Rev. Hord's messages were appreciated by those in attendance." Rev. Hayden Sparks was pastor of the Wolfsville United Methodist Charge.

RECIPE



MAPLE WALNUT COOKIES

Cookies:

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 1/2 to 2 cups self-rising flour
- 2 cups walnuts, coarsely chopped
- 1 teaspoon maple flavoring
- 1 teaspoon salt

Icina:

- 4 tablespoons butter 2 cups powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon maple flavoring
- 3 to 4 tablespoons milk
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Combine butter, sugars, eggs, flavoring, and salt and beat until just combined. Add flours, 1 cup at a time. If dough is sticky to the touch, add more self-rising flour in 1/4 cup increments until smooth. Stir in walnuts.
- 3. Shape into 1 1/2-inch balls and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in center of oven 9-12 minutes, until cookies are puffy and beginning to turn tan. Remove from oven and let cool.
- 4. Meanwhile, mix icing ingredients until texture is smooth and thick. Add more milk or sugar to achieve a creamy texture. Ice cookies. Makes 4 dozen.

Note: Original recipe says to scoop onto baking sheet, making 2 dozen cookies. Bake large cookies 10 to 13 minutes. I felt these were too large.

Fonda Gormer made these cookies for the Bee-lievers cookie exchange and provided the recipe.

March 3 – Third Sunday in Lent Final Words from the Cross "Behold Your Son... Behold Your Mother"

Rev. Adam Hamilton summarizes the significance of these final words of Jesus this way, "In this scene and in these final words, we see the courage of the women who were a part of Jesus' life and ministry.

We are reminded once more of the profound role that Mary played in God's redemptive work through Jesus Christ.

We recall Jesus' witness and call to care for our parents. We see a picture of what it means to be the church—Christians caring for those who are younger and those who are older, as though those in need were our children or our parents.

And we see in Mary, though favored by God, walked through this dark valley but— as Jesus himself expected her to do— carried on Jesus' mission after he was gone.

Jesus' words to 'Behold your son' and 'Behold your mother' remind us that this mission is ours as well— caring for those Jesus cares for as if they are our own family."



March 10 – Fourth Sunday in Lent Final Words from the Cross "My God, Why Have You Forsaken Me" Mark 15:29-36a

It was not enough to crucify Jesus. Those who thought themselves the most religious in Jesus' day wanted to crush his spirit. Those who prayed the night before during the traditional Passover meal for the coming of the Messiah were now mocking and spitting on the Messiah.

On the cross, Jesus felt abandoned and prayed, "My God, why have you forsaken me?" God had not abandoned him, but in that moment Jesus certainly felt abandoned. Jesus' words hold a mirror to us and we must ask, "Have I been the cause of another feeling abandoned?" Jesus' words also bring us hope. Jesus can help us because he knows what it is like to feel abandoned.

March 17 – Fifth Sunday in Lent Final Words from the Cross "I Thirst"

John 19:28-29

In the morning, when we rise, that first cold drink of water or juice feels great. When we've had surgery, the feel of an ice cube on our parched lips and in our mouth is very soothing. In dying, many people will still ask for a sip of water.

To thirst is a very human experience. When Jesus said from the cross, "I thirst," we are reminded that he was completely human just like us. Imagine his thirst dying on the cross, the mid-day sun glaring down on him. No matter how desperately we thirst, no matter how we suffer, Jesus can identify with us and help us because he thirst and suffered too.

One day at noon Jesus met a woman at a well. Jesus said to her, "If you knew who you were talking to, you would ask me and I would give you living water and you would never thirst again" (John 4:10). Jesus is the one who can quench our spiritual thirst.

March 24 – Palm Sunday Final Words from the Cross "It Is Finished"...

"Into Your Hands I Commit My Spirit" John 19:30a, Luke 23:43-47

On Palm Sunday, the people had welcomed Jesus into the city with a hero's welcome. By Friday, they had put him to death.

The religious leaders who were threatened by him had eliminated the threat. The Romans who feared social disorder had brought things back to order. And many a person, who had only days before prayed for the coming of the Messiah during the Passover meal, now joined with the crowd to kill the Messiah, screaming in rage, "crucify him!"

They were sure they had done away with the trouble-maker Jesus for good. But what they didn't realize is that on the cross they had actually crowned him King. When Jesus spoke the words, "Into your hands I commit my spirit," he was returning to God his Father to rule at his right hand over all the universe.

Where do we find ourselves in the crowd? Do we fully consider Christ to be the Lord of our lives?

March 31 – Easter Sunday Final Words from the Cross "On the Road to Emmaus" Luke 24:13-35

The two traveling companions journeying from Jerusalem to Emmaus were discouraged. Jesus, their spiritual leader, had been put to death and now they were returning home.

A man appeared on the road beside them coming from almost nowhere. He asked them how they were doing and shared stories from the Bible with them to lift their spirits. When they arrived to their hometown of Emmaus, they asked the stranger to have a meal with them.

During the meal the man broke bread and gave it to them and in that instant they recognized that their travelling companion had been Jesus, now raised from the dead. They rushed back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples who had been in hiding, fearing for their lives.

Then the risen Jesus stood among all of them and said, "Peace be with you." They must have celebrated with one another, "Jesus has risen; Jesus has risen indeed!"

With Jesus' resurrection, we no longer need to live in fear. We can now live with hope. By believing, our sins are forgiven and we have eternal life. That truly is something to celebrate.

- To pray for others that are in need
- To pray for our leaders and all those who serve us
- To pray for our congregation and community
- To pray for something specific for ourselves

I believe with all my heart that God hears our prayers and acts in our lives. I believe with all my heart that our prayers for others open a channel for God to work

in their lives. I believe with all my heart that God is pleased when we dedicate time to spend with him and talk with him.

Countless are the times I've failed to pray and have remained restless and confused. Countless are the times I have prayed and come away with peace and new insight. Prayer is a priority we choose to make or allow to slip by – it's a choice.

Our annual prayer vigil holds all of these opportunities listed above for you and me. I encourage you to participate in the prayer vigil on the day before Easter this year. Here's how it works:

Goal: Our goal is twelve hours of continuous prayer, from 12 noon to 12 midnight, having someone signed up for every slot.

• A sign-up sheet with half hour slots is posted on the bulletin board in the main hallway at church.

- \bullet Sign-up for one or more slots.
- It is fine if more than one individual or a family prays during the same time slot.
- On March 30, pray during the time slot you signed up for.
- You are encouraged to pray at the church, but you certainly may pray elsewhere, if that works better for you.
- Devotional materials will be made available for you to use during prayer in the sanctuary.

Jesus understood the importance and value of prayer and practiced it frequently.

During this Lenten season, we have been studying the prayers Jesus made while hanging on the cross: "Father forgive them for they do not know what they are doing." "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" "It is finished" "Into your hands I commit my spirit." Prayer got Jesus home. Prayer can do that for us too.

Please join me in participating in this important opportunity. Do it for yourself, do it for our congregation, and do it for our community. Most importantly, do it to honor the One who saved you.









