GIDEONS INTERNATIONAL

Frederick County - West Camp

Long before cable television, spa treatments and eco-friendly soaps and shampoos became staples in hotel rooms, there was the Bible - the

Gideon Bible. And the book with the familiar two-handled pitcher and torch on its cover that most guests find inside hotel nightstands doesn't appear to be going anywhere anytime soon. Close to 1.5 billion Scriptures have been distributed since 1908, when the Gideons first began to place Bibles in hotel rooms. Since then, the nondenominational evangelical group, run by businessmen, has spread its tremendous reach.

Because the Gideons were founded by Christian traveling salesmen who spent a lot of time away from home, the group sought to put Bibles in hotel bedrooms to spiritually nurture themselves and others.

Around 1916, the group started distributing Bibles within hospitals, followed by the military, public schools, prisons, and colleges and universities. The Gideons have about 176,000 members.



A LETTER FROM FRANK & NANCY STOTTLEMYER

Retired "New Tribes Mission" Missionaries

Dear Folks at Salem United Methodist Church:

MARCH 6, 2012 — First of all we want to thank you for your continuing financial support and prayer support for us. We appreciate it very much.

We trust that you are doing well. Nancy and I are both doing well. Nancy recently had minor surgery removing a cyst that had become infected in the weeks previously. Frank got a case of shingles in December & still has some "pricking" from that. Overall we have been in good health.

We're still doing pretty much the same things we've been doing for some time. Nancy continues to volunteer at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission three days a week, she also visits shut-ins, helps at church, does some sewing for friends, etc.

Frank continues to do some repair projects, visitation, and serves the board of our home church. He occasionally fills in as speaker in churches. There are soon to be some maintenance projects at Camp Tohiglo with which he plans to help. He also serves on a mission's committee that is organizing a mission trip to a Navajo



reservation in New Mexico — September 21-28, 2012.

As far as our family, our son-in-law, Lynn Harney, continues to minister at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission and helps at a local church. Wanda does home-schooling of their youngest son.

Eric, Wendy, & family are ministering to the Badyaranké people in Senegal. Eric is preparing Bible lessons to begin evangelistic teaching at the end of the rainy season this year. The young man who helps Eric express truths clearly in the Badyaranké language seems to be understanding the gospel message. Please pray for Nalin's salvation. Wendy is home-schooling two of their children. Their son, Jason, finishes his senior year in May. Pray for direction for him following his graduation.

Rebecca is also with the Badyaranké people. She is overseeing two literacy classes, helping with the preparation of the teaching lessons, and helping with Bible translation. She needs to have the



roof of her house replaced in the next few months.

Gary, Lisa & family are serving in Florida at the New Tribes Mission center for retired missionaries. Gary is mostly involved in grounds work and Lisa is mostly involved in meal preparation and office work.

We would appreciate prayer for the political situation in the country of Senegal. There is a hotly contested presidential election underway threatening peace and safety in the country. The runoff election between the two leading candidates is now scheduled for March 25th.

Thank you again for your important part in our lives and the lives of our family.

The items collected by the Myersville Cub Scout Pack 1051 have been a big help in stocking the shelves. There is currently a good supply of canned vegetables, such as green beans and corn.

Nevertheless, certain items are in high demand and the food pantry could use your help. The following is a suggested list of items to contribute: canned tuna, chicken, ham, or Spam; peanut butter, canned fruit, cereal, noodles, spaghetti, canned tomatoes, fruit juices, spaghetti sauce, canned spaghetti, ravioli, etc., and canned soups. Also needed are hygiene items: soap, toilet tissue, paper towels, laundry detergent, and dish detergent.

While some of these items are not food, they are items that cannot be purchased with food stamps or WIC vouchers, but are still needed in the home and are often the first things to leave the food pantry shelves.

Lilies, lift your petals white To the golden sun so bright; Children raise your voices sweet While we worship at His feet.



RECIPE



COFFEE CAKE POUND CAKE

PECAN STREUSEL

- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

POUND CAKE BATTER

- 1 cup finely chopped pecans
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 6 large eggs
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 cup butter

- 1 (8-oz.) container sour cream
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

3/4 cup chopped pecans

- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1. Prepare Pecan Streusel: Combine first 3 ingredients in a bowl. Cut in butter with a pastry blender or fork until mixture resembles small peas. Stir in 3/4 cup pecans.
- 2. Prepare Pound Cake Batter: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake 1 cup pecans in a single layer in a shallow pan 5 to 7 minutes or until lightly toasted and fragrant, stirring half-way through. Cool 20 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees.
- 3. Beat butter at medium speed with a heavy-duty electric stand mixer until creamy. Gradually add granulated sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating just until blended after each addition.
- 4. Stir together flour and baking soda; add to butter mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Beat at low speed just until blended after each addition. Stir in vanilla.
- 5. Pour half of batter into a greased and floured 10-inch (12-cup) tube pan. Stir together toasted pecans, brown sugar, and cinnamon sprinkle over batter. Spoon remaining batter over pecan mixture; then sprinkle with Pecan Streusel.
- 6. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes to 1 hour and 30 minutes or until a long wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on a wire rack 10 to 15 minutes; remove from pan to wire rack, and cool completely (about 1 hour).

Makes 12 servings. Hands-on time: 30 minutes. Total time: 3 hr. 25 min.

April 1 – Palm Sunday "A Journey to Hope" Lenten Sermon Series "Suffering" Mark 11:7-11, 15:9-15

On Palm Sunday, we end our Journey of Hope sermon series by taking on the subject of human suffering.

Suffering is a part of the human experience – we can't avoid it. Sometimes our suffering gets bad enough that we're left with but one word, "Why?!"

Human beings offer only incomplete answers to the plea, "Why?"

Fortunately Jesus provides a final answer, one that enables us to endure, and one that provides the hope we need.

Jesus suffered, understands our suffering, and can therefore provide for our needs when we suffer.

Jesus redeemed us from sin and death by dying on the cross and by being raised to life, offering us his gift of eternal life. The peace and hope this brings, trumps all suffering. Because of Jesus, our journey really does lead us to hope.

April 8 – Easter Sunday Holy Communion, 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. The Empty Tomb John 20:1-18

On that first Easter Sunday, everything began to make sense – the coming of a Messiah foretold by the Old Testament prophets, his death and resurrection foretold by Jesus himself, the appearance of the resurrected Jesus to Mary at the tomb and the disciples later in the day on Easter.

They must have been saying things like, "Jesus really is our long awaited Messiah?" "Yes, he really is!" "His resurrection confirms it!" "Jesus is our Lord and Savior!"

Nothing would be the same again. Hope that had not existed before now covered all the earth. God had reconciled human beings to God's-self once and for all time. No wonder this is the most sacred day in the whole year. How could it not be! The Lord has risen! The Lord has risen indeed! Alleluia!

April 15 Jesus Appears to His Disciples John 20:19-21

Sometimes when we read these verses, we don't notice when it was that Jesus first appeared to his disciples as the resurrected Lord. It was in the evening on that first Easter, the very same day Jesus had been raised. He did not withhold himself; he did not keep the disciples guessing.

Jesus had the ability to reassure the disciples, so he did. He passed through the locked doors to the room where they had gathered, stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!"

He showed them the wounds that resulted from his crucifixion to build up their faith, and then he showered them with a gift – the Holy Spirit.

We sometimes lock ourselves behind the closed doors wanting to keep out our doubt and fear. But Jesus finds a way into our lives to reassure us, to bring us peace, to pour out the Holy Spirit into us so that we too are renewed and empowered.

April 22 Jesus Appears to the Disciples Luke 24:36b-48

The Gospel of Luke provides the account of another appearance of the resurrected Jesus. "Jesus said to the disciples, 'This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets, and the Psalms,' Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures" (Luke 24:44-45). The Bible is God's living word. The Bible is an ongoing conversation between God and humanity. When we study the Bible, God speaks to us. Christ sent the Holy Spirit to be with us when we study, and to help us understand what God has to tell us and teach us. God is still "opening their minds so they could understand the Scriptures." When we open our Bibles, we can be assured that God is already with us to open our minds.

April 29 The Shepherd and His Flock John 10:11-18

In this passage from the Bible, Jesus draws a clear contrast between himself and others with whom we might put our trust. "When he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. The wolf attacks the flock and scatters it" (John 10:12b), contrasts with this about himself: "I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me – just as the Father knows me and I know the Father – and I lay down my life for the sheep.

I have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also. They too will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd" (John 10:14-16). Jesus cares for us and protects us like no other. Through Jesus, God is made known to us. Through Jesus, our broken relationship with God has been restored for eternity. And these gifts offered to us, are also offered to everyone, everywhere. How do we respond in gratitude to such awesome gifts as these?
