





But, Father, I am guided still, Much more than words can tell, By your desire to see tasks through And do what is done well.


Your caring smile, your love of life, Your kind and patient ways Are guideposts which I shall attempt To honor all my days.

RECIPE



Cherry Cheese Pie

3/4 cup all-purpose flour 3 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened

1 can (21 ounces) cherry pie filling

1 pkg (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1/3 cup sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

In a bowl, combine the flour, sugar and salt. Add butter; stir until combined. Press onto the bottom and up the sides of a 9-in. pie plate. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until lightly browned. Pour pie filling into crust.

In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, sugar, egg and vanilla until smooth. Carefully spread around outside edges of pie, leaving a 3-in. circle of cherries exposed in the center. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until edges begin to brown. Cool on a wire rack. Refrigerate for several hours before serving. Yield: 8 servings.

Shadows fall at evening tide, Myriad stars are clear and bright, As silently the darkness spreads A dusky robe upon the night.


Linger summer, do not go. You are hastening away. All too soon these days will be Memories of yesterday.

June 3 – Confirmation, Receiving New Members Inviting Our Neighbor John 4:39-41

Samaritans and Jews did not associate with one another. But Jesus had a habit of challenging unjust practices.

So, one day he and the disciples traveled directly through Samaria. At noon they stopped at a well. Jesus remained at the well while the others went off for food. There Jesus invited a Samaritan woman to believe in him. She did believe, and immediately ran back to her neighbors to tell them her story and to invite them to Christ. Then they believed too.

You also have invited others to Christ and as a result of your efforts, four of our youth are being confirmed today and, along with them, several adults are becoming members of our church family today.

June 10 – Youth Sunday Working With God Luke 5:17-26

The paralyzed man in this story had no way of getting to Jesus without the help of his friends. The way his friends



worked with God made the difference in this man's life.

He couldn't get to Jesus to be healed, so his friends put him on a mat and carried him to the house where Jesus was healing the sick.

When they arrived at the house, they still couldn't get their friend to Jesus because the house was packed with people. So they went up on the roof, made a hole, and lowered the man down through the roof to Jesus, who healed the man.

We are proud of our children and youth. They are here each Sunday learning how to work with God, and as they lead worship today, they share with us some of the things they have learned.

June 17 – Father's Day Fruit of the Spirit Sermon Series "Love"

Today starts our Summer Sermon Series, "The Fruit of the Spirit." We begin the series where God begins. We take up the topic of love.

It is appropriate to be listed first among the fruit of the spirit — love is the greatest force in the universe.

God is love in its purest form. God calls us to love as God loves — unconditionally. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

Jesus reduces God's commandments

to these two: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" and "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-39).

On the day we celebrate the love of our earthly fathers, we acknowledge that there is no love greater than the love of our heavenly Father.

June 24 Fruit of the Spirit Sermon Series "Joy"

"Joy" follows right after "Love" in the list of the Fruit of the Spirit. God wants us to have joy.

Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10).

A life centered on God's love brings joy into our personal lives and motivates us to spread that joy to others.

It doesn't mean that we will not encounter bad times in our lives; some may be terribly bad. It does mean that even amidst those bad times, our underlying joy will remain intact, perhaps more in the background for awhile, but intact.

Jesus dying on the cross secured eternal life for us. That gives us the hope in the future we need, and the joy that comes with it.

When we go about our daily tasks, and as we invite others to Christ, and as we help each other grow in faith and serve others, we do it joyfully. We are secure in our faith and our future.

GENERAL CONFERENCE

he General Conference, a quadrennial gathering which draws together a body of 1,000 United Methodists from around the world to set the policies and priorities of the denomination, was held April 12 through May 4, 2012, in Tampa, Fla.

Clergy Delegates from the Baltimore-Washington Conference were T. R. Chattin, Laura Easto, Conrad Link, Rodney Smothers, J. W. Park, Joe Daniels, and Joan Carter-Rimbach.

Laity Delegates from the Baltimore-Washington Conference were Tom Price, Sandy Ferguson, Darius Butler, Melissa Lauber, Edith Williams, Charlie Moore, and Jen Ihlo.

United Methodists from five continents addressed a wide range of challenging issues, including church structure and human sexuality, and engaged in an Act of Repentance toward indigenous people during their 10-day legislative gathering.

Meeting in the Tampa Convention Center, steps away from the waters of Tampa Bay, the 988 delegates recalled through worship, song and sermon the healing and transforming ministry of Jesus beside the Sea of Galilee.

As storms on the Sea of Galilee alarmed the disciples, so too, conflicting stands on structure and social justice

troubled the delegates and some 4,000 visitors and staff. Perhaps the most surprising lightning strike occurred at 4:30 p.m. on May 4, the final day of the assembly, when the delegates received word from the church's supreme court that a major piece of legislation regarding restructuring violated the denomination's constitution

Afterward, Bishop Larry M. Goodpaster of the Charlotte (N.C.) Area, outgoing Council of Bishops president, sought to comfort a frustrated assembly at the start of the evening session. "God always provides a way," he said.

In addition to restructuring and the Act of Repentance, General Conference addressed a wide range of topics. The delegates:

- Retained the church's position regarding homosexuality [i.e., "The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching."]; deciding not to adopt language that would have said United Methodists are not of one mind on this issue;
- Did away with "guaranteed appointments" for clergy;
- Rejected a proposal for setting aside a bishop to serve as full-time president of

- Entered into full communion with a number of historically black pan-Methodist denominations;
- Approved making the United Methodist Women an autonomous organization rather than operating it under the church's missions agency;
- Created a national ministry plan for Pacific Islanders;
- Adopted a \$603.1 million budget for the 2013-2016 period; and
- Decided not to divest from three companies whose products are used by the Israeli military in the occupied Palestinian territories.

The delegates, from more than 60 nations, processed some 1,200 petitions during the assembly. General Conference meets every four years and is the only body that speaks for the 13 million-member denomination.

APRIL 2012 — Last month I went to a friend's wedding. As part of the preparation, I had my hands and feet painted with henna. My friends loved the design, and were thrilled that I was participating in this part of their culture.

Just as my eyes were constantly


drawn to the palms of my hands throughout the day, reminding me of my friend and her wedding... so also God remembers us and thinks of us.
