

She would not make an appointment but did agree to take our "Before You Decide" brochure which covers fetal development, procedures and risks.

A few days later, after reading the brochure, she called to say that she could not go through with her abortion and made an appointment for an ultrasound. She was 12 weeks pregnant. I want to thank you for sowing into this ministry and helping to keep our doors open. Imagine if we were not here and she went somewhere else that would have encouraged her to abort! Your financial gifts are very important and greatly appreciated.

Parking Lot

Salem's Board of Trustees is looking into having the parking lot parking spaces repainted. The Trustees also discussed having the parking lot seal coated prior to the painting, but after receiving three estimates, the group decided it was cost prohibitive. Interestingly, Toni from L.W. Wolfe told us they do not recommend it.

Shrubbery

The Trustees accepted a bid from Vernon Stottlemyer of Mountain Valley Lawn Service, Loy Wolfe Road, to trim the shrubbery around the church. Vernon completed the job on Saturday, June 22.

Salem's Board of Trustees meets the first Thursday of each month.

Salem will host Charge Conference in October

The fall schedule of charge conferences was recently released by the Cumberland-Hagerstown District of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church. Unlike recent years, charge conferences for our district (Cumberland-Hagerstown District) will be held in more than 14 different locations.

On October 23, Salem will be the host church where five churches will gather to submit annual conference-required paperwork and celebrate the ministry of each church. The churches meeting at Salem will be Garfield & Salem/Keedysville Cooperative Parish, Mt. Zion/Myersville, Pleasant Walk, and Salem/Wolfsville.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Conrad Link, will call the meeting to order, offer devotions, prayer, and introductions. Then each church will be offered an opportunity to present 3-6 minutes of ministry that is taking place for all to hear. Following the ministry presentations, Rev. Link will conduct a time of sharing, dialogue, and commentary about the special needs of the churches, community and ministry we might be doing together. More details later.

I don't know what the future holds, but He is already there. His love is constant, and I can trust Him as I leave what is familiar (my village) and step into the unknown. RECIPE



HONEY-ORANGE GINGER COOKIES

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat 2/3 cup sugar and 1/2 cup butter, softened, at medium speed with a heavy-duty electric stand mixer until creamy. Add 1/2 cup honey, 1 teaspoon orange extract, and 1 large egg, beating until blended. Stir together 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour, 1 tablespoon orange zest, 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, and 1/2 teaspoon baking powder; gradually add to sugar mixture, beating until blended.

Cover and chill 30 minutes to 1 hour. Shape dough into 1-inch balls; roll in sugar. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet, and slightly flatten each with bottom of glass, if desired.

Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely on wire racks (about 20 minutes).

Makes about 4 dozen.

going on in this passage.

We're told that Mary sat at the Lord's feet. That took some courage. It went against all social norms at the time for a woman to sit among the men and be taught by the Rabbi/teacher.

Then there is the resentment — the resentment that Martha holds toward Mary for not helping her prepare. Martha even inquires of Jesus, "Don't you care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself?"

There is also Jesus' response to Martha, encouraging her to rise above life's distractions and see what is really important.

Today is our Ice Cream Social where we'll eat a great meal and afterward, great ice cream. We'll hear great music, and have a great time launching our balloons. But like Martha we could get so caught up in all

this that we miss the greatest opportunity the Ice Cream Social and Balloon Launch holds out for us every year — the simple opportunity to fellowship together and to invite someone from our community to fellowship with us — to laugh, to share stories, to encourage each other, and to welcome new friends to join together with us.

Jesus encourages Martha, "Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." Through this story, Jesus speaks those words of encouragement to us also.

At our annual Baltimore-Washington Conference in May, our new Bishop, Reverend Marcus Matthews, challenged each congregation to do three things this year: pray, adopt a school, and bring a person to Christ.

I like these goals. They keep us grounded in Christ, while we go forth to serve others and help others who need Christ in their lives.

Wolfsville Elementary School is on our doorstep. It seems such an obvious mission field for us. We can impact the future of our community by being positive influences on the children who attend Wolfsville School, and their families.

The Wolfsville Volunteer Fire Company is physically even closer to us. Is there an opportunity for us to serve our firefighters who risk their well-being to protect the lives and property of our community? I'm sure there is.

Discerning what God is calling us to do next, to grow in our own personal faith and to grow in our service to others, all starts with the Bishop's first goal for us — a life of prayer.

In today's scripture reading, the disciples approached Jesus sensing that Jesus benefitted by prayer and that they might also. "One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray...'" (11:1a).

Let's take up our Bishop's challenge about prayer — it's a modern day restatement of the challenge Jesus gave his followers: "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; and he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened" (11:9-10).

Are we asking? Are we seeking? Are we knocking? Jesus wants us too. There are benefits in us doing so.

May 29-31, 2013 ... in Baltimore

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Salem was represented at Annual Conference in Baltimore

Pastor Bob and Michael Burrier represented Salem, along with more than 1,700 United Methodists from 646 area churches, who gathered May 29-31 to sow seeds of worship, learning, mission, stewardship and holy conferencing in their continuing efforts to grow disciples for the transformation of the world.

The 229th Session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference was held at the Marriott Waterfront Hotel in Baltimore. It was led by Bishop Marcus Matthews, who once served as a pastor, district superintendent and Council of Ministries director in the conference and returned last September as our episcopal leader.

Bishop's Request of Local Churches — The bishop asked churches to do three things in the coming year: (1) become prayer stations, (2) bring at least one person to Christ, and (3) adopt a public school in its zip code.

New Faith Communities — Conference members learned about seven new faith communities being created. The leadership teams who are starting these new churches were consecrated.

The new faith communities represent the diversity of the conference. Five are multi-cultural in vision and mission, two seek to serve the growing Korean population, two grow out of largely African-American congregations, two spring from Anglo congregations and one is multicultural from the outset.

Apportionment Percentage Factor

Remains Steady — During a plenary session May 30, the members, in an unprecedented unanimous vote, adopted a \$16.8 million budget for 2014. The approved budget represents a 1.6 percent decrease in spending from 2013 and a 7 percent decrease from the 2012 budget.

The benevolence factor for local churches' apportionments will remain steady at 17.75 percent. (Salem currently pays \$15,151 in annual apportionments to the Baltimore-Washington Conference.)

Ordination Service — At an ordination service, Bishops Matthews, West Virginia Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball and retired Bishops Joseph H. Yeakel and Violet Fisher commissioned 17 Provisional

Elders and ordained 8 Elders in Full Connection.

Memorial Service — During the Memorial Service on Thursday evening, 16 pastors who died during the previous year were honored; and 22 clergy spouses, 2 Bishops, and 5 Bishops' spouses were remembered.

Next year's Baltimore-Washington Conference is scheduled to convene Thursday, May 29 through Saturday, May 31, 2014, at the Waterfront Marriott Hotel in Baltimore.

Robert Kells will serve at Weller in Thurmont.


