

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53rd annual Lord's Acre Festival successful at Ruritan Park

he Lord's Acre Festival is an event that has been blessed by God for 53 years. Our sincere thanks to the Wolfsville community for once again supporting our annual event. Despite some touch-andgo weather, we were blessed with a successful evening. Thank you!

The Lord's Acre has become one of Wolfsville's community events, and a good crowd came to the festival to eat, talk, and buy something to take home.

Lord's Acre History

The Lord's Acre program began as an interdenominational movement among country churches in western North

Carolina in 1930, as a means of raising funds in small congregations with limited financial resources. A portion or "acre" of a church member's land was set aside to raise crops to be sold to benefit the church. Livestock was also dedicated for this purpose. Those without land could set aside a portion of their needlework, craft items, or any other saleable talent they possessed. The Lord's Acre Festival is a sale of those donations.

Over the years, Salem's Lord's Acre has followed that "concept" — church members and friends donate items to sell, and the profits go to the church.

Wolfsville's "First" Lord's Acre

Some of you will remember our first Lord's Acre Festival held 53 years ago, on October 8, 1960, during the pastorate of Rev. John W. Schildt. It all started with a letter to the congregation in the spring of that year, which included suggested projects. As you read the following parts of the letter, written in 1960, think of the Lord's Acre today— how it has changed and how it has stayed the same.

"For those who are using vegetable produce, eggs, a portion of milk, or other

perishable products as their projects, we suggest that it might be well to bring in your proceeds each week to the program treasurer. This is also suggested for those on the Lord's Hour, that you bring in the first hour's wage, each week.

"For those who will be raising calves, rabbits or pigs; and for those who will be doing needlework through the year, these will be saved until our Lord's Acre Festival in the fall, with soup, sandwiches, soft drinks—perhaps the Middletown High School Band to play; display stands for the needlework, and then the day will be highlighted by an auction of the animals, bulk farm produce, etc.

"This program has been a lifesaver for the rural church. New churches have been built, those in a bad shape or repair have been repaired, new educational units and materials have been added, and the rural church has been strengthened. This has been made possible because the people have worked together, children and adults alike, having their individual projects and work-

ing for the Lord, and for the improvement of their church.

"The pastor will work with the official board on this project. We hope to come around, especially to those of you who have agricultural projects, to have prayers of dedication and to ask the Lord's blessing on your project. This may, and will be done gladly whether the project is located in the field, barn, garden, etc."

That first year, the Salem congregation was enthusiastic about Lord's Acre, and profits from Salem's first festival in 1960, totaled \$742.34.

At that time, Salem's goal was to build the educational building which was estimated to cost around \$20,000, and the building fund had only \$1,500 at that point.

Use of Lord's Acre Profits at Salem

Over the years, profits from the Lord's Acre have made possible the educational building (1967), the parsonage (1974-75), the parking lot and its many improvements and additions (1968, 1993, 1998, and 2007), and many smaller maintenance and improvement projects to our existing buildings and grounds.

At the present time, Lord's Acre profits are very important for improvements and maintenance of our existing facilities.

For example, during the last 12 years, air conditioning was installed in the sanctuary; an elevator, handicap restroom, storage rooms, and new flooring were installed; the church steeple was restored; interior and exterior painting was completed; repaired sanctuary floor understructure; repaired and waterproofed classroom walls; renovated the parsonage; purchased new refrigerator and freezer for the kitchen; replaced stucco on sanctuary exterior walls; constructed new concrete floor under the sanctuary; replaced windows in educational building and parsonage; and replaced spouting on parsonage.

As of this writing, this year's income totaled \$20,112.76. With some expenses yet to be paid, a full report, indicating the amount of profit, will be published in next month's newsletter. Profits will be placed in Salem's Building and Improvement Fund.

The success of this event is a testament to the ties between this church and the Wolfsville community. It's a time of praise to our Lord and a time when we experience warm fellowship among friends and neighbors.

Five more walkers walked at a different time, to make the total number of 59 walkers in this year's CROP Hunger Walk. (There were also 4 canine walkers.)


So far, \$4,007 has been pledged, with more funds expected, as walkers collect from their sponsors. A final report will be published when all monies have been turned in.










October

Meat Loaf — Barbecue Style

1 1/2 pounds ground chuck Salt Chopped onion Pepper

1/2 cup bread crumbs 1/2 can tomato sauce (small 8-oz. size)

Mix thoroughly and form into loaf. Place in shallow pan and cover with sauce. Bake in oven 400 degrees for 1 1/4 hours.

1 1/2 cans tomato sauce (8-oz. size) 1/2 cup water 3 tablespoons vinegar 3 tablespoons brown sugar 2 tablespoons prepared mustard 2 tablespoons Worcestershire

Pour all over and around meat. Baste occasionally while baking.

hank you very much to the community for supporting our Lord's Acre festival this year. Even with less than favorable weather, you made the effort to come out and support us and we really appreciate it!

This month, I want to call your attention to two growing ministries at Salem.

Worship in October

During October, we will be continuing our sermon series "Healthy Families." Here are the upcoming topics:

October 7 – Holy Communion World Communion Sunday Healthy Families: Loving My Parents Proverbs 23:22-25 and Ephesians 6:1-3

In his letter to the church in Ephesus, Paul instructs, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother – this is the first



commandment with a promise: so that it may be well with you and you may live long on earth" (Ephesians 6:1-3).

Just as parents are instructed to love and care for their children, children are instructed to love and honor their parents. It is both right and natural for loving children to return the love and care first given to them by their parents. Paul encourages us that peace comes to us as we love and care for our parents. Paul says, "It is well with us."

October 14 Healthy Families: Loving My Church Family 1 Corinthians 12:12-26, Colossians 1:17-20

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul compares the church to the human body (1 Corinthians 12:12-26). Christ is the head of the body (Colossians 1:17-20). None of us is the whole body. Each of us is only one part of the body – a foot, a hand, an eye, an ear. This comparison of the church to a human body makes the truth of the church very clear – each of us has something important to offer and we need each other if the church is to be healthy.

When we value the gifts in ourselves and others, and when we offer our gifts in service and encourage others to share their gifts, we are building up the health of the church.

October 21 Healthy Families: Loving My Neighbor

Matthew 22:34-40, Luke 10:25-37

We started our Healthy Families sermon series with the topic "Loving God." We end our series with the topic "Loving

My Neighbor." Both are commanded by God and necessary for a life of genuine faith.

One day Jesus was asked the question, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus was a Jew. Jews believed that their neighbor was another Jew only. In answering the question that day, Jesus changed the definition of neighbor to include all human beings – those like us and those unlike us.

To truly practice this in our lives today is just as radical as it was then. If we're going to follow God's commandment, "Love thy Neighbor," we need to include all human beings, not just those like us.

October 28 – Reformation Sunday Bold Faith – "The story of Blind Bartimaeus" Mark 10:46-52

Today is Reformation Sunday. Martin Luther (1483-1546) led with bold faith to reform the church of his day.

In Jesus' day, there were also people who had bold faith. When Bartimaeus, a blind beggar, was sternly ordered by others to be quiet, he continued to shout, "Jesus, have mercy on me!" Because of his boldness, Jesus noticed Bartimaeus and restored his sight.

Does anyone notice our faith? When we die, will anyone miss the faith we shared? The world is hungry for people with bold faith. Jesus is counting on us to be those people.
