


Poinsettias to adorn Salem sanctuary


FOREVER YOUNG AT CHRIST-

CROP Walk raises over \$4300 for hunger and disaster relief

All the pledges have been collected from the 2013 CROP Hunger Walk. In addition to the 42 walkers on September 22nd, we had five people walk at other times. Together we raised \$4390.75 for hunger and disaster relief efforts around the world.

Twenty-five percent of funds raised will be returned to local hunger programs at the Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs, the Middletown Food Bank and Salem's Food Pantry.

The remainder will be used by Church World Service worldwide. Their major emphasis at this time is emergency relief to the typhoon victims in the Philippines.

Update on Brent Blickenstaff

As most of you know on September 7, 2013, our lives were changed completely. We nearly lost our beloved Brent. Fortunately God had other plans.

While enjoying the surf at Ocean City, MD, Brent was knocked down and hit the ocean floor with tremendous force. Brent remembers hitting the ground and feeling pain then going numb. He was floating unconscious and was lifted from the water by a muscular angel who carried him to shore. Brent was resuscitated on the beach by life guards and EMT. He was then flown to Salisbury Hospital and a few hours later to UMMC Shock Trauma in Baltimore where he has been receiving treatment for C1 and C2 fractures of the spine and a severe spinal cord injury. Brent's doctors have likened his injuries to those of Christopher Reeves.

Brent was in the neuro ICU for the last two months. We have seen many miracles already. Brent's mind is sharp and we communicate with him by reading his lips and using a Navy cypher to spell out words using eye blinks. Brent has endured

and overcome infections, multiple surgeries, daily lung treatments, invasive tests, and even the removal of a cancerous kidney. Our Lord has brought him through all these trials with an amazing spirit and Brent's usual spunk and determination. Brent and I have been lifted enormously by all the prayers - we have felt God's power! Brent's faith has helped him survive and endure all these trials.

We have acquired a computer utilizing a technology called "Eye Gaze Technology" which allows him to type using his eyes. We look forward to him being able to email using this computer in the near future.

Monday, November 18th, Brent was air ambulanced to Craig Hospital in Englewood, Colorado, where he will begin 3 to 4 months of rehabilitation. He was very eager to take this next step. Craig Hospital is well known for their success with people of Brent's level of injury. We look forward to witnessing many more miracles the Lord has in store for him.

Bailey and I are now in Colorado and will reside there for whatever length of time Brent's rehab requires.

RECIPE



APPLE CRANBERRY MUFFINS

1 3/4 cups flour 1/4 cup sugar 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 3/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1 egg, well-beaten 3/4 cup milk

1/3 cup vegetable oil

1 cup apple, peeled and finely chopped 1/2 cup chopped frozen cranberries

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, stir together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon. When well mixed, make a well in the center of the dry ingredients.
- 2. In a separate bowl, blend together egg, milk, oil, apple, and cranberries.
- 3. Add all at once to dry ingredients. Stir just until moistened.
- 4. Fill paper-lined or greased muffin cups about 2/3 full.
- 5. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes, or until tops are lightly browned, and toothpick inserted in center of muffins comes out clean. Cool in tins for 10 minutes. Then remove and continue cooling on wire rack.

Note: Dried cranberries can be used, and Granny Smith apples are a good choice, but other baking apples work also.

uring the upcoming Advent and Christmas Seasons, we will embark on a new sermon series entitled "We Were There." The series explores the Christmas story from the personal perspective of several of the story's leading characters. I hope this series will be a blessing to each of you as we celebrate this holy time together.

During Christmas, people hunger for greater meaning in their lives. Advent and Christmas are natural times to invite friends and neighbors to worship and fellowship with us. I pray this Christmas will bring you closer to Christ, and I pray each of us will answer God's call upon our lives to help point someone else to Christ. May you have a blessed Advent and Christmas this year.

December 1 – Advent 1 Holy Communion "Zechariah and Elizabeth" Luke 1:5-25, 57-80

God comes to Zechariah with a promise. Zechariah doubts God's promise and loses his voice. Elizabeth becomes pregnant at her advanced age; this isn't supposed to be possible but it happens. Through Elizabeth's pregnancy and the birth of his son, Zechariah no longer doubts God and regains his voice, naming his son John who as "John the Baptist" prepares the world for the coming of Jesus.

We doubt too, and loose our voice. In our lives, God makes good things happen that shouldn't. God's actions are meant to build up our faith, but sometimes we fail to notice. Regardless of our response, God remains faithfully at work in our lives and the world.

December 8 – Advent 2 "Mary" Luke 1:26-56

Imagine God's messenger coming to a young teenage girl, engaged to be married, announcing that she has conceived a child through the power of the Holy Spirit, that she will give birth, and that the



baby she carries in her womb is the Son of God who has chosen this time in history to come and save the world?

Imagine the range of emotions: disbelief, fear, lack of confidence. And the questions that must have run through Mary's mind: How will I explain this to Joseph? What will I say to my parents? What will my friends say when the baby starts to show? Will I be convicted and stoned to death? If God has chosen me will God protect and sustain me? How will this all play out? Like Mary, we have our own fears and questions. Like Mary, when God asks us to step out in faith God provides for all our needs.

December 15 – Advent 3 "Joseph" Matthew 1:18-25

Joseph must have felt betrayed by Mary. They did not have relations, yet she was with child. "Pregnant through the power of the Holy Spirit," she explained to Joseph. Really? Joseph must have been thinking, "You don't really expect me to believe that, do you Mary?" But God saw Joseph's need, and God came to Joseph to calm his fears and provide answers. So much so that Joseph fully responded to his role as husband and father, standing against the ridicule of family and friends, getting Mary safely to a place where she could give birth, leading the family to safety in Egypt and back again, and raising Jesus in the faith. People have loved us, protected us, cared for us, and sacrificed for us. And God calls us to love, protect, care for, and sacrifice for others. In that way, we are all Joseph.

December 22 – Advent 4 "The Shepherds" Luke 2:1-20

The shepherds were among "the least." The occupation of shepherd was one of the lowliest occupations of all. Shepherds were looked down upon. But who did God decide to lift up on Christmas? Who did God invite first to visit the Savior - it was the shepherds "living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them." And the "good news and great joy" that the angels were bringing to share was going to be shared with whom first? - The shepherds. What does this tells us about God? It tells us that God seeks out the least, the last and the lost, bringing justice and righteousness

There are times in our lives when we feel like the least, the last, and the lost and God sees our plight and comes to us. And there are times when God chooses us to bring Christ to the least, the last, and the lost around us.

December 24 – Christmas Eve Worship and Program – 7:00 p.m. Open House at the Parsonage – 8:30 p.m. NOTE: There will not be an 11:00 p.m. candlelight service this year.

December 29 – Christmas 1 "The Wise Men and King Herod" Matthew 2:1-12

Already at his birth, Jesus is shown to be the Lord and Savior of all people. Were the wise men Jews? No. The wise men (Magi) studied the Hebrew Scripture of the day but they were not Jews, and they lived nowhere nearby. They had traveled a great distance from far-away lands to the east. Like the shepherds, the wise men point to an important characteristic – that God is the God of all humankind and that God's love and care extends to all people, everywhere, across all time. Not everyone receives God's love and care. King Herod was threatened by Jesus. He thought, "If Jesus is the king of the Jews, as the wise men claim, where does that leave me?" So Herod instructed the wise men to return after visiting Jesus to inform him of Jesus' whereabouts. He wanted to eliminate the threat of Jesus by killing him. Jesus is our savior, not a threat or one to avoid. A variation of the popular saying goes "Wise men, and wise women, still seek Jesus."

January 5 – Christmas 2 "Simeon and Anna"



Dear Folks at Salem United Methodist Church:

NOVEMBER 2013 — We want to thank you sincerely for your financial support and for your prayer support for us.

Nancy and I remain in good health. We stay busy doing pretty much the same things we've been doing for several years. Nancy volunteers three days a week at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission, visits several shut-ins, helps at church, does some sewing for friends, and other things. Frank continues to do some work for shut-ins & others who need help, serves on the board of our home church, teaches an adult Sunday school class, is treasurer of our home church, and serves on the FBC mission committee.

As far as our family, our son-in-law, Lynn Harney, ministers at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission as well as working at FedEx a few hours at night. Wanda does home-schooling of their youngest son. Their daughter, Keshia, is studying at Messiah College. They have a son and his family in California and

another son who lives with his parents while he works at a security job and takes some college on-line courses.

Eric and Wendy returned to Senegal October 27th. Eric is working on getting a hand water pump for a well that serves the village of about 800 people where they live. Jason is looking for a fulltime job while taking what part-time

Ministry in Nicaragua



Two more balloon cards returned... much to our surprise!




More than fifteen weeks after our Ice Cream Social and Balloon Launch on July 21, we were surprised to receive two more balloon cards.
