





# **GERMAN CHOCOLATE CAKE COOKIES**

 cup butter, softened
 cup Domino™ Granulated Sugar
 (3.9 oz.) box JELL-0 Chocolate Instant Pudding Mix
 large eggs
 teaspoons McCormick™ Pure Vanilla Extract

2 1/4 cups all purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup chopped pecans1 1/2 cups sweetened flaked coconut, divided

1 cup M&M's™ Brand Chocolate Candies

Pam™ Baking Spray

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat butter and sugar with a mixer on medium-high speed 5 minutes or until fluffy. Blend in pudding mix; add eggs and vanilla, mixing until yellow disappears.
- 2. Whisk together flour, baking soda, and salt; blend into butter mixture. Stir in pecans, 1 cup coconut, and candies. Portion dough with a 1/4 cup scoop and place 8 pieces on lightly sprayed, foil-lined cookie sheets; press tops with remaining 1/2 cup coconut. Bake, in batches, 13 to 14 minutes or until puffed and set. Makes about 2 dozen.

Note: For a smaller cookie, use a heaping tablespoon of dough.

# May 4 – Holy Communion Third Sunday of Easter God's Care in Difficult Times Sermon Series - "God Brings Healing" Matthew 8:5-13

A Roman soldier came asking Jesus to heal his servant. Jesus offered to go to the servant. The soldier acknowledged Jesus' authority and believed Jesus had the power to heal by just commanding it.

Seeing his faith, Jesus healed the soldier's servant. He said to the soldier, "Go! It will be done just as you believed it would."

One day shortly before his arrest, Jesus was in the home of Simon the leper. A woman came to Jesus and anointed his head with very expensive perfume. Others were greatly disturbed but Jesus received the care the woman gave him.

Jesus is a good role model for us. For some, it is easy to give care but we find it

very awkward to receive care. God calls upon us to do both— give and receive.

When we graciously receive care, the one providing the care receives God's love and support and grows in faith.

# May 25 – Sixth Sunday of Easter God's Care in Difficult Times Sermon Series "The Care Giving Congregation" Acts 2:42-47

In the care giving congregation, excellent care is provided and no one in need is left behind. The pastor can't accomplish this alone. The pastor and a team of care givers can't accomplish this alone. It takes a deliberate effort on the part of the whole congregation working together to bring Christ to those in need.

Acts 2:42-47 describes a first century "fellowship of believers" formed to provide care for those in need. I'm sure this fellowship wasn't perfect, but their deliberate efforts produced excellent results.

# **FOOD PANTRY News**

God works in mysterious ways!

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), more than 720,000 Marylanders are food insecure – uncertain of where their next meal is coming from. Of that, 460,000 of them live in the Maryland Food Bank's service area and they miss 79 million meals each year because they do not have consistent access to sufficient amounts of food. This is the gap that the Maryland Food Bank and other food assistance providers must bridge (beyond what we are already doing) to end hunger in our region.

Recently the Maryland Food Bank asked us to survey the families that come to our Food Pantry, so that we can learn what their food insecurity situation is.

On the survey we asked what we could provide that would be helpful for them. Meats and fruits were the top items on their request list. As we all know these are high dollar items at the store.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) is run through the USDA. The USDA purchases foods, including processing and packaging, and makes it available to Maryland State Distributing Agencies. This is usually meats and cheese. Helene Ridenour, who runs Tabatha's Table food pantry in Smithsburg, has been approved to distribute this government food. They also have the means to store this monthly distribution.

Through this program, households must meet the State eligibility criteria in order to receive this free food. If households already are eligible for other state assistance programs, they will be eligible for TEFAP program.

So starting in May, we will have our Food Pantry families, and any other families you may know that need assistance, come on the third Saturday of every month between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon to our church parking lot. A van will be in the parking lot for distribution.

It just amazes me when we need something God makes the provisions! What a blessing this will be for our families!

I would like to thank Dennis Draper in advance, who agreed to help pack and distribute this food. If we did not have the willingness of our volunteers to support this program, we would not be able to help those in need.


So please continue to keep our families in your prayers as they are struggling to provide just the basic needs.

Salem United Methodist Church:

Thank you so very much for your faithfulness in sending financial support for us and your praying for us for many years.

Neither Nancy nor I have any major health problems as far as we know and we are so thankful for that blessing. We are still doing pretty much the same things we've been doing. Nancy still volunteers three days a week at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission, she visits several widows, serves in the church nursery, does some sewing for friends, and other things. Frank continues to do some work for shut-ins & others who need help, serves on the board of our home church, teaches an adult Sunday school class, is treasurer of our home church, and serves on the FBC mission's committee. Of course any outside work has been limited these past months because of a pretty cold winter.

As far as our family, our son-in-law, Harney, ministers at Hagerstown Rescue Mission as well as working at FedEx a few hours at night. Our daughter Wanda is home-schooling their youngest son. Their daughter,

Keshia, is studying at Messiah College. They have a son and his family in California and another son who lives with his parents while he works at a security job and takes some college online courses.

Eric, Wendy, and their youngest daughter are ministering to Badyaranké people in Senegal. Eric taught through the Bible for evangelism to people who had never before been taught the Bible. He taught a series of chronological lessons six nights a week for several months. There was strong opposition from Muslim leaders who put pressure on many people; especially village leaders. Even so, many came, listened, and it seems clear that some have trusted Christ as Savior! There are no doubt others who are still reluctant to express themselves because of the pressures on them. After a break of a couple weeks, Eric began teaching again so people can better understand, and we trust more will believe. Their daughter, Tara, is a senior finishing home school courses. Jessica's husband completed courses to become a Christian counselor and is looking for an opportunity to minister in that area. Shawn is in his third year of college at



Penn State. Jason is still looking for a fulltime job while taking what part-time work he can get now.

Rebecca is also part of the missionary team ministering to the Badyaranké people. She has several classes going to teach people to read in their own language. It is so encouraging to hear of some reading the portions of scripture that have been translated into the Badyaranké language. Rebecca also helps with things regarding the Bible teaching; especially talking with ladies and children to see how well they understood.

Gary, Lisa & family serve at the New Tribes Mission Homes, a center for retired missionaries in Florida. Gary is mostly involved in grounds work and Lisa is involved in meal preparation and office work. They always seek to be a blessing to the "retired" missionaries living there doing special things for them and talking to them as they have opportunity.

Thank you again for the vital part you have in our lives, the lives of our family, and those to whom we all minister.
