

## RECIPE



### EASY GINGER COOKIES

Heat oven to 375 degrees.

Stir Gingerbread mix (Betty Crocker Ginger Bread Cake & Cookie Mix)  
Add 1/4 cup hot water  
Add 2 tablespoons margarine, melted  
Stir with spoon until dough forms.

Shape dough into 1 inch balls.  
Place balls 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet.  
Flatten to 2 inches in diameter with greased bottom of glass  
dipped in sugar.

Bake 8 to 10 minutes until edges are firm.  
Makes about 2 1/2 dozen cookies.

This month's sermon series, *Living in the Body of Christ*, gives us an opportunity to explore and celebrate being a member of the local church we know as Salem.



### June 1 – Ascension Sunday Holy Communion Living in the Body of Christ "I Will Uphold My Vows"

#### Acts 7:54-60

A man named Stephen was the first Christian martyr. He took a vow to live in the body of Christ – to pray, to be present, to share his talents, and to serve. He gave his life to uphold his vow. When we become members of a local church such as Salem, we take the same vow Stephen did



– to pray, allowing God to guide our way as we stay close to God; to be present, actively participating in worship, growing in faith, serving others, and inviting others to receive Christ; to share our God-given talents, building up the lives of others; and to serve those in need.

## A Tribute to JOAN E. HARSHMAN

November 16, 1949 — May 3, 2014

Joan was “the glue that held the family together.”

The members and friends of Salem Church were saddened to learn of Joan Harshman's death at the age of 64. We knew that she was struggling with complicated health issues which necessitated admission at Meritus Medical Center, Johns Hopkins, and Georgetown hospitals.

After spending many weeks in the hospital, Joan came home just before Easter. Her husband Meredith, of 40 years, brought her to church on Easter Sunday where she thanked everyone for their prayers, cards, and many acts of kindness. She told us she was being assisted at home by a home care nurse and had additional upcoming appointments at hospitals to assess further diagnosis and treatment.

However, her earthly journey suddenly ended with a heart attack on the evening of May 3, 2014.

A funeral service was held at Salem on Thursday, May 8, 2014, with Pastor Bob Snyder officiating. Following the service, burial was at Salem's cemetery.

In preparation for the service, Pastor Bob met with Meredith and their two children, Jeff and Sarah. Pastor Bob said, “The conversation turned to sharing remembrances of Joan. Meredith didn't hesitate. ‘She was the glue that held the family together.’ Jeff and Sarah added, ‘She was thoughtful, generous, giving; a helper to others.’ Meredith chimed in, ‘She took care of everything.’”

Joan, along with Meredith, were faithful regulars at Salem's Sunday worship and Sunday School, and active in the work of the church, always attending the 9 a.m. traditional service. Joan was an integral part of the Women's Sunday School Class.

Referring to Joan's two grandsons, Jack and Jase, Pastor Bob commented, “Every time Meredith and Joan brought them to church, you could just see the pride Joan had in them. It was written all over her.”

Pastor Bob continued, “Sarah remembers how much it has meant that her mother babysat Jack and Jase, especially when Sarah was working

more. She didn't have to worry so much — the kids were safe with mom. I observed a few years back how well Joan cared for Meredith's mom, when Catherine was in the final stages of her life. I remember Catherine saying how much she appreciated that. I'm told Joan also helped care for her mom and her mom's sister that way too. Meredith said, ‘Joan was the glue that held us together.’ Isn't that a wonderful thing to have your family say about you.”

Joan served on church committees and was Salem's Financial Secretary for five years, 2004-2005 and 2007-2009. She took this position very seriously. Every Sunday she counted the worship offerings, confidentially recorded each family's giving, deposited the funds, and provided a deposit ticket to Salem's treasurer. She was very dependable as evidenced by the fact that during those five years, she rarely asked an assistant to fill in for her. And finally, at the end of each year, she would prepare a financial statement for each family detailing their giving for the year.

For many years at Salem's annual Lord's Acre Festival, Joan, along with Meredith, served as cashiers, taking orders at the food stand for food and drinks.

Joan was also known at Salem for her homemade peanut brittle. She made it for the Lord's Acre and at various other times of the year with profits going to Salem's United Methodist Women Bee-keepers group. Peanut brittle was not the easiest thing to make, she would say... apparently the weather of the day played a role... humidity and other factors would affect the outcome. She would take advance orders and bring it to church along with some extra for those who did not get their advance orders in.

Joan also possessed outstanding skills at making cross-stitch pictures. Pastor Bob said, “Meredith took me down the steps to the lower level of their home to show me pictures Joan had cross-stitched of Civil War heroes. They are so detailed and well done, they look like photographs. Joan was patient in her work — some projects took months to

complete. She was meticulous, tearing out and redoing work until she was satisfied.”

Pastor Bob continued, “Joan was thoughtful and generous in doing cross-stitch work as gifts to others, especially on special and meaningful occasions. Items of her work adorn our church and some of your homes. I'm sure some of you right now are reflecting upon a time Joan came to you and said something like, ‘here, I made this for you,’ and how much it meant to you when she did.

“God says to us, ‘I've given you a gift to share with others, to build them up.’ Through her baking, through her cross-stitch work, Joan followed God's rule — she shared her gifts and built up other's lives and they remember.”

Joan was also fond of particular places where she would relax and rest. She enjoyed time spent by the river; trips to Ocean City, and Lancaster County, PA.

Pastor Bob said, “One day when I visited Joan in the hospital she shared, ‘When I get out of here one of the first things I want to do is go to Lancaster County.’”

“Aside from these brief times away, Joan was always very faithful in attending worship and Sunday school on Sundays, and she'd always make sure the coffee was ready for the Men's Sunday School Class — that was Joan.”

The Salem congregation expresses its deepest sympathy to the Harshman family. Joan will be sorely missed at Salem Church. Memorial contributions may be made to Salem.

The family wishes to thank Joann Leatherman, organist; Ginny Haddock, special music at the funeral; and Salem Outreach for the luncheon to honor Joan.
