



IMAGINE NO MALARIA

The People of the United Methodist Church

Every 60 seconds, malaria claims a life in Africa. Imagine No Malaria is an extraordinary effort of the people of The United Methodist Church, putting our faith into action to end preventable deaths by malaria, especially the death of a child or a mother.



The Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, of which Salem is a part, has committed to raise at least \$2.1 million to save 210,000 lives. Salem is joining with many other local United Methodist churches by pledging \$2,820 to be paid by the end of next year (2015). Of that amount, Pastor Bob's family has pledged \$1,200 toward the project, and for the rest (\$1,620), the Salem congregation is being given the opportunity to contribute.

Salem's goal is to give a minimum of \$648 to this effort at the end of 2014. The balance will be provided next year. It is estimated the funds from Salem will save 282 lives. Please join us in supporting this worthy project. More details on page 9.

RECIPE

HAM & PASTA BAKE

- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon dried minced onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper 2-1/2 cups milk

 package (10 ounces) frozen chopped broccoli, cooked and drained
cups elbow macaroni, cooked and drained
cups cubed fully cooked ham
4 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Topping:

2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

In a medium saucepan, combine the flour, onion, salt, mustard and pepper. Gradually stir in milk until blended. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened and bubbly. Stir in broccoli, macaroni, ham and cheese. Transfer to an ungreased 2-qt. baking dish. For topping, combine butter and bread crumbs. Sprinkle over macaroni mixture. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until golden brown. Yield: 6 servings.

Note: Don't hesitate to bake it one day and reheat it the next— it tastes even better the day after.



Zebedee who is mentioned several times in the Bible. This is James the Less, son of Alphaeus.

He is only mentioned once in the Bible — when he is included in the listing of Jesus' twelve disciples.

The Greek word for "Less" is mikros which means little in stature or young of age. James, perhaps young and short, appears to have quietly stayed in the background being a disciple of Jesus.

James the Less reminds us of all those who quietly serve our local churches who have their ministry, and week after week faithfully carry it out with no fanfare — maybe you're one of those people. If you are, know that God sees your faith and good work and stands ready to reward you in heaven.

New Mission Project at Salem: "Imagine No Malaria"

Salem's Administrative Council recently initiated a new mission project (Salem Mission Project No. 17) to support the "Imagine No Malaria" efforts of the United Methodist Church.

Salem is joining with many other local United Methodist churches by pledging \$2,820 to be paid by the end of next year (2015). The funds from Salem will save 282.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, of which Salem is a part, has committed to raise at least \$2.1 million to save 210,000 lives.

Every 60 seconds, malaria claims a life in Africa. Imagine No Malaria is an extraordinary effort of the people of The United Methodist Church, putting our faith into action to end preventable deaths by malaria, especially the death of a child or a mother.

Achieving this goal requires an integrated strategy against the disease. As a life-saving ministry, Imagine No Malaria aims to empower the people of Africa to overcome malaria's burden.

The Imagine No Malaria approach is focused on four key areas: prevention, education, communication and treatment. Prevention: To date, Imagine No



Malaria is responsible for the distribution of 1.2 million insecticide-treated bed nets throughout the continent. Your gift will help us reach 2 million nets to protect families and save lives?

Education: We know that local people are the most credible and trusted source for information about malaria. We have trained more than 5,400 community health workers to personally deliver mosquito nets and measure usage rates. Recent efforts in Sierra Leone and the Democratic Republic of Congo have produced net usage rates exceeding 80 percent.

Communication: Behavior-change communication includes how to use and care for a bed net, and when to seek treatment for the disease. In addition to word-of-mouth outreach, the United Methodist radio station in Cote d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast) broadcasts messages about malaria to thousands of listeners each day.

Treatment: The United Methodist Church operates more than 300 hospitals, clinics and health posts throughout Africa. This vital healthcare infrastructure is a critical part of how we will overcome the disease. In order to be effective, however, these facilities must have lifesaving resources like rapid diagnostic tests and malaria medication. We are in many hard-to-reach places, beyond the reach of many aid organizations, sometimes even governments.

Working side-by-side with local communities, national departments of health, other nonprofit organizations (like Nets For Life, UNICEF, International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies) is precisely the way we will beat this disease.

Because of your support of Imagine No Malaria, you've given another community in Africa reason to celebrate. People in the Bo District of Sierra Leone are dancing in the streets because Imagine No Malaria is distributing nearly 400,000 long-lasting insecticide-treated bed nets this month.

14 Years Since Last Update Sound System Repairs and Improvements for Salem

Salem's Administrative Council recently approved a proposal from DSL Sound, Hagerstown, to repair and improve the sound system in the sanctuary. The current sound system, which was installed 14 years ago by DSL Sound, has served us well but is in need of repairs and improvements. Several components are either no longer working or are working intermittently, such as the handheld wireless and lapel microphones, a speaker floor jack, and the amplifier that pushes sound into the educational building.

DSL Sound will replace the wireless lapel microphone (for Pastor Bob to use), the wireless handheld microphone, plus an antenna to run both microphones. In addition, they will replace and expand all the existing floor jack microphone inputs and speaker outputs; replace the

amplifier that pushes the sanctuary sound into the educational building; replace the existing sound board to expand the number of inputs from 10 to 16 (all of our existing inputs are currently used); update our recording and duplicating capabilities with a new digital recording deck to record our worship services directly onto a CD or onto a memory card; and provide a duplicator unit to copy recorded services onto multiple CDs.

Also included in the sound system upgrade will be two portable listening devices for those who need a little help to better hear the worship service.

DSL Sound will handle all of the installation and wiring. They will also train us on using the new components. DSL Sound has been great to work with through the years— answering questions and responding to service calls.

Total cost of the new equipment, plus labor for installation, wiring, and training is \$8,460.


