THE MEANING OF THE CHRISTMAS TREE






Winter Cheer

RECIPE



CHOCOLATE CHIP CLOUDS

3 large egg whites room temperature 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar 1/2 cup sugar

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 cup dark chocolate morsels Sprinkles (optional)
- Heat oven to 300 degrees. Cover cookie sheet with nonstick silicone or parchment paper.
- Beat egg whites and cream of tartar in large bowl with mixer at high speed until soft peaks form
- speed until soft peaks form.

 3. Add sugar a little at a time, then vanilla, continuing to mix until stiff
- peaks form, the sugar is dissolved and mixture is glossy.

 4. Fold in chocolate chips and drop by tablespoons onto cookie sheet.
- Bake 35-45 minutes or just until dry. Cool slightly, remove from cookie sheet. Cool completely on wire rack. Store at room temperature. Makes 30 cookies.

Pastor's Notes... and Worship in January

DURING JANUARY we'll return to our Sermon Series, "The Five Big Stories of the Bible."

We covered the Old Testament in "Creation and Fall" (Story #1) and "The People of God in Exodus, Covenant, and Exile" (Story #2). Now we move to the New Testament with Story #3, "Jesus the Messiah."

Having just celebrated the birth of Jesus, it's a good time to study the life of Jesus. Jesus is our role model. When we follow his example and when we allow him to lead us through life, we find the hope, peace, and joy Jesus offers.

Our goal in "The Five Big Stories" has been to use our Bibles more – to connect our life situation with the stories in the Bible, to find God there and God's help. 2015 offers a new opportunity to read our Bibles the whole way through.

Pick up a copy at church of the free "Our Daily Bread" devotional or click on "Our Daily Bread" at

salemchurchwolfsville.org and do the readings listed under the heading "The Bible in One Year."

By this time next year you will have read the Bible and you will have built a closer relationship with God, the One who loves you and cares about you and wants to help you through life. Happy New Year! $-Pastor\ Bob$

January 4 Epiphany Sunday, Holy Communion The Five Big Stories of the Bible Story #3 – Jesus the Messiah "Escape and Return"

Soon after Jesus' birth, Joseph was warned that his family was in danger. Herod the King wanted to kill Jesus. Joseph immediately fled with Mary and Jesus to Egypt, where they remained until the death of Herod. They left their home, family, and work to live as aliens in a foreign land. Imagine what that must



have been like! Time passed and Herod died. Joseph thought his family could return to the Holy Land and settle in Bethlehem. But Archelaus, Herod's son, continued the policies of his father and Jesus' life was still in danger so the family continued north and settled in Nazareth.

There are seasons in our lives when we're "in danger." Because of his own experiences with danger, Jesus can help us during the times of danger in our lives.

January 11 – Baptism of the Lord The Five Big Stories of the Bible Story #3 – Jesus the Messiah "John the Baptist"

John the Baptist prepared the people for the coming of Jesus' ministry. He gave them the opportunity to confess their sins, to be forgiven, and to have their relationship with God restored.

John made it clear that he was not the long-awaited Savior of his people. Through John, God was preparing the people for their Savior – One who would die for them and send the Holy Spirit to be their helper through life.

Before John, God had spoken through the prophets. The lives of seventeen prophets, from Isaiah to Malachi, are included in the Bible.

Who are the people in our lives who act as prophets for us – a pastor, a teacher, a parent, a friend, or even someone who rubs us the wrong way? How is God

speaking to us through them?

Through these prophets, what is God trying to show us or get us to do?

January 18 The Five Big Stories of the Bible Story #3 – Jesus the Messiah "Jesus' Baptism"

At first, John the Baptist did not want to baptize Jesus. He said to Jesus, "I should not be baptizing you, you should be baptizing me." The Bible tells us Jesus wanted John to baptize him "to fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15).

At the very beginning, Jesus is showing us the kind of ministry he will have. He is going to be our role model. Everything he expects of us, Jesus is going to first do himself. He does this to show us the right way to live as seen through God's eyes (not our own).

It's worth knowing how Jesus lived. It's worth having specific examples from the Bible of what Jesus did so we can call upon them to guide our actions.

Jesus died for us and we treasure that. Jesus also lived for us to show us how we should live. When we seek to follow Jesus, we seek to do the right thing as seen through God's eyes.

January 25 The Five Big Stories of the Bible Story #3 – Jesus the Messiah "Jesus' Temptation"

Jesus' ministry started with him acknowledging God as the Lord of his life - Jesus' first act was to be baptized.


His second act was to be severely tempted. Satan offered Jesus the opportunity to end hunger, to show off his power, and to have earthly wealth and possessions for himself. In all ways that he was tempted, Jesus resisted. How? In his own words, he "worshipped the Lord his God and served him only."

In daily life, we are tempted in all kinds of ways. At times we grow weak and want to give in. How do we resist and prevail? The same way Jesus did, by calling upon God.

When tempted, we can pray the simple prayer, "God help me resist this temptation." Faced with God, Satan runs. If we're used to praying, we'll naturally pray when we're tempted.

The opposite is true too. If we rarely pray, chances are we're not going to call upon God for help.

With God it is possible to prevail over the things that tempt us.

We want to "thank" Betty Brandenburg for many years of being our church representative to the Board of Child Care Auxiliary! She and I know the importance of this ministry which provides intensive residential treatment services to youth, ages 12 to 21.

My first experience with the Board of Child Care was when Pastor Randy

asked our praise band "Works in Progress" to help with worship at the Falling Waters facility. Our praise band saw first hand what this ministry is doing to change young people's hearts.

Falling Waters is a 50-bed facility for boys and girls. Youth reside in five cottages, each containing 10 individual bedrooms, a kitchen, living room and laundry room.

The campus also has a school, recreational building, dining hall, chapel and clinical building with a health suite and confidential space for individual and family therapy services.

At the residential facility, they give therapeutic and academic support to help youth overcome emotional and behavioral issues and function responsibly in the community. Their mission is an outreach ministry of the United Methodist Church.

Through the residential and community-based services, the agency will endeavor to provide a safe, healthy and caring environment that seeks to sustain children and families by fostering self-esteem, respect for the community, a sense of purpose and life skills needed to achieve their highest potential.

What we need of you is your prayers and membership to the Auxiliary which was created back in 1953, to allow men and women to help enhance the lives of children served by the Board of Child Care; and help educate the church community and others about Board of Child Care services.
