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Readiness 360: Salem receives results of survey taken by Salem members

Background

The Readiness 360 Survey helps congregations see and carry out God's vision. Salem participated in the survey November 29 to December 20, 2014. With an average weekly worship attendance of 92, we set a goal of having at least 25 survey participants. We were very pleased that 53 people took the online survey. Thanks again to all who participated!

Rev. Bill Warehime led us through the survey process. He initially met with Salem's Administrative Council to brief us on the benefits of taking the survey and to explain the steps in the survey process. All were invited to join the Administrative Council to review the results of the survey at a retreat held on Saturday morning, January 31. Rev. Warehime was the retreat facilitator.

Survey Results

The survey measured four areas: Spiritual Intensity, Missional Alignment, Cultural Openness, and Dynamic Relationships. Here are the summary statements from the Readiness 360 Report for each of these areas. Greater detail is provided in the complete Executive Summary Report. Copies are available for you to review on the information table at church.

❖ Spiritual Intensity (84%) – "All great Christian movements are intense spiritually, marked by deep love for God and a surrendering to what God is seeking to do through human beings. It is critical that a spiritual fire burns within the hearts and souls of those leading and participating in the life of the church. Without personal passion for Christ we lack an adequate source of spiritual energy for vital and multiplying ministry. In many respects, Salem is on fire in its love for God, but there is also some

hesitation to go the full mile. It is well worth exploring what is limiting you in the area of Spiritual Intensity. You are so close to having the fuel necessary to multiply ministry."

❖ Missional Alignment (80%) – "Highly fruitful churches consistently prioritize the investment of their resources (time, talent, treasure) according to their Biblical vision and mission. Plans and major initiatives must stem clearly from Biblical mandates and a quest for fruitfulness. There is a willingness to let go of strategies that aren't bearing much fruit. The more churches do this the better they are aligned. Many folks at your church have a good sense of where God is calling you to go, but others are not aligned with this point of view. There is seldom enough personnel or financial resources to run in many directions at once. Now is a time for serious conversation about Salem's priorities."

❖ Cultural Openness (73.5%) – Since the first century, effective churches have been reaching across cultural boundaries to share the Christian good news with diverse people, who begin with different experiences, perspectives, and stories. Churches that

exhibit fortress behaviors or who spend excessive time mourning social change often have difficulty sharing life with new kinds of people. On one hand, many in the church want to reach diverse people, but many in the church still have great apprehension about what this might mean in terms of changing the face of Salem. There may be some limitations in terms of how far the church is able to reach toward different kinds of people in the next few years. Open communication will be critical.

❖ Dynamic Relationships (79.97%) -Disciple making depends in large part on our relational skills; our relationship with God and with others. A church's people must develop good habits for leading others into a transformative relationship with God through Christ. In some respects, your church has seen some amazing relationships and friendships

across the years. However, the DNA of these relationships is not currently indicative of the church as a whole. You have some work to do in terms of cultivating trust within the church and relating effectively with folks who are different than the majority of the members."

Next Steps

Seeking to see and carry out God's vision for our church, retreat participants agreed to the following next steps to be completed over the next 30-90 days:

• Community Outreach

Plan an event, possibly held at Salem's pavilion, to honor and thank community service organizations (School, Volunteer Fire Department, Ruritan, etc.)

Invite New People Bring 10 visitors to worship

Spiritual Gifts and Talents

Offer a study on Spiritual Gifts

Communicating Your Ideas

Retreat participants also listed these items as possibilities to explore further: going on a mission trip again, continuing to explore additional ways to use social media to reach new people, and reviewing the way we welcome and practice hospitality to visitors.

If you have thoughts on any of the above items or additional ideas, please communicate them.

All worshippers are welcome to attend Administrative Council meetings held the second Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. If you can't attend a meeting, please communicate your ideas to any one of the council members.

Recent Repairs and Maintenance

Salem's Board of Trustees has been busy with small maintenance and repair projects. Robin Haupt replaced the power cord on one of the vacuum cleaners.

Brandon Leatherman replaced a portion of the baseboard trim in the hallway on the lower level of the educational building.

Additional storage containers were purchased to store the church's Christmas decorations.

Ellsworth Electric checked sanctuary ceiling lights and replaced bulbs as needed. G & M Heating and A/C Inc. repaired one of the parsonage heat pumps.

Donald Stottlemyer installed bulletin boards and pictures which had been removed to paint the social room walls. One additional 4 x 6 bulletin board was purchased and installed in the social room for use by the Hero's Club after school ministry.

Customers Come First Fire Protection LLC replaced eight of the church's fire extinguishers during the annual inspection. The batteries in the alarm panel were also tested.

Salem's Administrative Council recently approved the purchase of up to three additional shelving units for Salem's Food Pantry, which has moved into a new larger space on the lower level of the educational building.

Salem's United Methodist Women "Bee-lievers" are planning to replace the existing drapes in the social room with new window treatments.



Western Region Leadership Days 2015

During January, the Western Region of the Baltimore Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church conducts "Leadership Days," a training event open to anyone in our conference. This year's event, held at Otterbein UMC in Hagerstown from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m., began with check-in and refreshments, then went right into the training classes.

There were three breakout sessions during the day. Participants could choose from one of seven different classes offered in each session.

This year Dennis Draper (Chair of our Staff Parish Relations Committee - SPRC), Laura Snyder (Co-Leader of our "Faith Builders" youth group), and I attended the event. We thought the training event provided practical information we can use in our ministries right away. Here are the classes we attended and an item or two we learned from each class:

❖ Session 1 (9:00-10:30 a.m.)

Shepherding and Supporting: The Work of the SPRC in the Local Church

(Dennis) - "There is more to the SPRC than just doing staff evaluations. We are there for anyone who has a problem with another person."

Moving Ahead with Your Youth Ministry (Laura) – "Youth need a place to call their own in the church, a room they can decorate and feel relaxed in. The theory is, this allows the youth to be themselves in a comfortable and safe space."

Re-thinking the Way We Do Church for Younger Generations (Bob) –

"Younger generations want to make an immediate difference. They are drawn to hands-on local mission projects."

❖ Session 2 (11:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m.)

Church Board of Trustees Orientation (Dennis) – "It is God's church but the trustees are responsible for the building. Trustees are responsible to maintain a safe and inviting place to worship."

Supporting Families and Individuals Living with Mental Illness (Laura) – "I

RECIPE



St. Patrick's Day Scones

4 cups all-purpose flour

1-1/2 cups dark raisins

1 cup sugar

2 sticks (1 cup) margarine 2 eggs

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup milk

4 teaspoons baking powder

Egg wash: 1 egg and 1 tablespoon milk

- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Whisk together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder in a bowl. Gradually mix in raisins so they are evenly distributed. Add margarine in small cubes and mix in with fingers or pastry blender until evenly blended.
- 3. Whisk together eggs and milk in small bowl. Gradually stir into flour mixture until dough forms; work dough with hands if necessary, but do not overwork.
- 4. Drop scant 1/2 cup amounts of dough onto 2 ungreased baking sheets.
- 5. For egg wash, beat together egg and milk in small bowl. Lightly brush each scone with wash.
- 6. In two batches, bake scones in 350-degree oven for 20 to 23 minutes or until lightly golden.

Makes: 18 to 20 scones


During March, we'll continue our sermon series, "Jesus the Messiah." Summaries of weekly worship topics are provided below. Invite a guest to come with you to worship services on the Sundays during Lent; it might be just what they need at this time in their life. May we experience Christ in a meaningful way this Lent.

March 1 "Jesus' Miracles" Matthew 8:1-10:42

These verses recount many miracles performed by Jesus: healing a man with leprosy, causing the centurion's servant to walk again, curing Peter's mother-in-law and healing many into the evening, restoring two men that were violent, healing a paralytic, bringing a dead girl back to life, curing a woman who had been bleeding for twelve years, giving two men their sight back and a third man his ability to speak.

Jesus performed miracles "so that you may know the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins" (Matthew 9:6). What miracle has Jesus done for you and me? His death has restored our lives. That's a miracle!



March 8 "Opposition to Jesus" Matthew 13:53-16:12

Jesus faced opposition from the people of his hometown. "They took offense to him" (13:57). John the Baptist, his colleague in ministry, was beheaded and Jesus "withdrew to a solitary place" (14:13). After he fed five thousand people with five loaves of bread and two fish, Jesus "went up on a mountain by himself to pray" (14:23). Those closest to him lacked faith and doubted (14:31).

The religious leaders would not see how far they had strayed in their faith and continually opposed Jesus' attempts to restore true faith (15-16:12). Jesus persevered in his ministry by going to God in prayer. God sustains us in our ministry when we frequently go to him in prayer.

March 15 "Jesus, the Son of God" Matthew 16:13-18:35

At Caesarea Philippi, Jesus came right out and asked his disciples "But what about you? Who do you say I am?" (16:15). Then Jesus predicted his death and resurrection and stopped Satan's efforts to tempt him not to die on the cross (16:21-23). Jesus took Peter, James, and John along with him up on a mountain where Jesus became dazzling white; white as the sun (17:2). God appeared on the mountain and repeated

the same thing God said when Jesus was baptized, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." But then God added something. God commanded Peter, James, and John, "Listen to him!" (17:5). God was at work showing people that Jesus is the Son of God. How do we see God at work in our lives today to strengthen our faith and trust?

March 22 "Jesus Turns toward Jerusalem" Matthew 19:1-20:34

The turn from his ministry in Galilee to travel to Jerusalem was a defining moment in Jesus' life. He knew traveling to Jerusalem meant his own torture and death nailed to a cross. He has decided not to turn. I'm sure there was a part of him, probably a very big part that kept saying "don't do this." But he knew that he must do it to fulfill God's salvation plan for humankind. So he made the turn and went to Jerusalem and died for us and rose again, freeing us from sin and giving us life. Jesus modeled "the turn" for us. I believe we all have to make "the turn," the turn from the things that we haven't vet surrendered to God. Things that separate us from God's love, forgiveness, and sustaining power. Jesus can help us make "the turn" because of the day he turned toward Jerusalem.

Jesus wants us to turn completely to him to fully receive his gifts of forgiveness and life.

March 29 – Palm/Passion Sunday "The Final Week" Matthew 21:1-25:46

On two back-to-back Sundays Jesus would take us from misunderstanding him, to completely understanding who he was and why he came. In seven-plusone days Jesus would go from warriorking (Sunday) to despicable criminal (Friday) to King of the universe (Sunday).

Palm Sunday started that final week. It was a day that showed how deeply people longed for a savior. They threw their outer garments in front of him, they waved palm branches high into the air above their heads, and they shouted "Hosanna!" because they desperately yearned for someone who would save them from their difficult lives.

We know now what they didn't yet know on that first Palm Sunday. Jesus is the Savior. Christ does get us through the difficult times of our lives. We can follow our Lord and Savior with confidence!


Family Roller Skating Party in Waynesboro

learned about NAMI, an organization that supports, advocates, and educates families dealing with these issues and lets them know they are not alone."

How to Develop and Update a Safe Sanctuaries Policy (Bob) –

"This policy helps protect both children and adults. In many churches the Staff Parish Relations Committee maintains this policy because they are used to handling confidential matters."

- Lunch Break (12:30-1:30 p.m.) Great box lunches with a variety of selections were provided by "Panera Bread."
- ❖ Session 3 (1:30-3:00 p.m.)

Church Meetings: A Valuable Part of Your Mission and Ministry (Dennis) – "Should always start on time, stick to the subject, and be no longer than necessary."

Young Adult Ministry (Laura) – "We talked about getting the young adults involved with church. With this

age group, we really need to think outside the box. It is important for the rising adults to still feel they have a place in their church home."

Discovering Your Spiritual Gifts (Bob) – "Knowing the Biblical background of spiritual gifts, taking a spiritual gifts survey, and knowing how to link spiritual gifts to needs in the congregation and community, helps us share our spiritual gifts with others. We can pray to God to give us a spiritual gift we desire. For example, we can pray to God to give us the gift of being a more compassionate person."

Next Steps

Several of the classes at "Leadership Days" will help move forward tasks already underway at Salem or items we should begin to undertake, including:

- Administrative Council has set the goal for the length of our meetings to an hour and fifteen minutes; an hour and a half at most. Council met our goal in our February meeting.
- Our Safe Sanctuary Policy needs to be updated.

"Leadership Days," along with the recent Readiness 360 Survey and the Bob Farr seminar back in the fall, provided useful information on inviting and welcoming new people into congregations.
