Salem to portray "The Last Supper" on Holy Thursday, April 2

The Salem United Methodist Church, Wolfsville, will present a living dramatization of Leonardo da Vinci's "The Last Supper," on Holy Thursday, April 2, at 7:00 p.m.

Church members will attempt to duplicate the look and feel of da Vinci's famous painting, where he chose what he considered to be the most dramatic moment of The Last Supper, that moment just after Jesus said, "One of you will betray me."

Instantly, the 12 apostles became men of 12 different moods. The only composed person was Jesus himself. In the excitement, Judas overturned the container of salt... and Peter drew his knife. Some of the apostles just stared at Jesus in amazement... some just looked at each other in unbelief.

At the beginning of the service, the apostles will move up the main aisle, take their places at the table, and casually mingle. Jesus will then proceed up the aisle and take His place at the table. Once Jesus takes his place, Jesus and the apostles will go into a

motionless pose like the ones in the painting. Each will come out of their pose only to speak.

In turn, the 12 apostles speak their minds to themselves, to each other, and to Jesus. They are reflecting on the tragic words which they had just heard Jesus speak. Those words being, "One of you will betray me." Each end their dialog with the dramatic words "Is it I"?

Holy Communion will be served, first to the apostles, then to the congregation. Everyone is invited to attend.

New Laptop and Software Purchased

We have finally taken the step to upgrade the church laptop and EasyWorship software. The laptop is used every Sunday in our 11:15 a.m. contemporary service, occasionally in our 9:00 a.m. traditional service, and at various other special services.

The old laptop was showing its age. It was beginning to struggle with the latest video media, causing our worship videos and audio to skip to varying degrees. The Wifi and battery also have not worked for several years. It has been a very good machine (8 years of use is remarkable), but it was time to upgrade.

We were also running a dated version of EasyWorship software. The software had been revised three times since our 2006 purchase but we never upgraded. The latest version was just released at the beginning of 2015.

It was surprisingly difficult to find a machine that included the features we needed at a reasonable price. But, after much research, we found a model made by MSI that had exactly the features we needed and no more. We were impressed by the specs and build quality and the features needed to smoothly run EasyWorship and the increasing availability of HD video. We began using the new machine on Sunday, March 15, and it worked without a hitch.

Our thanks to Michael Burrier and Jim Laky for their research and advice to help us find a laptop that meets our requirements, at a reasonable price.

RECIPE



Baked Corn & Broccoli Pudding

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 4 cups broccoli florets
- 4 cups corn kernels

Grated zest of 1 lemon

(yellow part only)

Freshly ground black pepper

1/3 cup flour

- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1. Use 1 tablespoon of the butter to butter a 9" x 13" baking dish. Arrange the broccoli florets at each end of the dish. Put the corn in the center. Sprinkle the lemon zest over the broccoli, and grind pepper over the
- 2. In a bowl, combine the flour, salt, sugar, and remaining butter. Gradually add the eggs and mix well. Stir in the milk to make a thin batter. Pour over the vegetables.
- 3. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 1 hour until the egg mixture is set and firm. Bake longer, if needed. To test the pudding, insert a silver knife in the center. It is ready when the knife comes out clean.

W. Brent Blickenstaff

The Salem congregation wishes to express its deepest sympathy to the family of Brent Blickenstaff, 58, who passed away Wednesday, February 25, 2015, at Citizens Nursing Home in Frederick.

Brent was a member of Salem Church, and interestingly, was a direct descendent of the Hoover who founded Salem Church, 196 years ago, in 1819.

Brent's father, George, grew up in the Hoover house at the corner of Wolfsville and Harp Hill Roads, and Brent lived in a home on the property. His grandmother, Gladys, was a Hoover before marrying Harry Blickenstaff.

Brent had many interests including Civil War history, and his ancestry certainly has a rich pre-Civil War history in Wolfsville.

A funeral service was held on March 2, at Salem, with Pastor Bob Snyder officiating. Burial was in Salem's Cemetery, where many of Brent's ancestors are also buried.



Pastor's Notes... and Worship in April

ost of us will be receiving this newsletter on or before Palm Sunday, the start of Holy Week. Please pay attention to Holy Week. It is a special opportunity each year to come close to God and stay close all week long, experiencing his love, wisdom, power, and care.

If it hasn't been part of your routine, I really encourage you this year to attend all the Holy Week services: Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday. Also, on Holy Saturday, participate in the Prayer Vigil and bring your family to the Easter Egg Hunt.

I can pretty much guarantee that your encounter with God on Easter Sunday will be more fruitful because you attended the Holy Week services leading up to Sunday. I believe the time you invest will be rewarded.

Easter Sunday this year will be the kick-off of a five-week worship series titled, "The People of God Gathered and Sent." This is the fourth of the "Five Big Stories of the Bible" we have been studying since the fall of last year. Weekly worship themes in this series are summarized below.

April 5 – Easter Sunday Holy Communion "Jesus' Resurrection, Our Response" Matthew 28: 1-10

As a mental exercise, believers will agree that Jesus' death and resurrection changed our future. We are saved. After we die, we are going to heaven. But have these gifts from God changed our hearts? Have they changed the way we live in the world right now? Jesus' death and



resurrection are as much about the way we live our lives each day as they are about our life after death. Our resurrection lives start now, in the present, and continue on after our earthly lives come to an end.

Jesus' death and resurrection can't just be a mental exercise ending in "I believe." Our proper response is to put those words into action: to live in Christ, to follow Christ now, to strive to become more and more like Christ now in the present. God's great acts of love call for us to act.

April 12 – Second Sunday of Easter Story #4 - The People of God Gathered and Sent "The Church – Formed by God"

Acts 2:1 states, "When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place." Verse 4 continues, "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit."

The church was not invented by humans! The church was formed by God. God led those first disciples together to be the Church and then God filled the church with the Holy Spirit.

God continues to do so now. The church is a particular place where God chooses to be present. If God loves the church this much, shouldn't we love the church too?

Some people will say, "I don't need to go to church to be a Christian." I

believe that kind of thinking really leaves God disappointed.

April 19 – Third Sunday of Easter Story #4 - The People of God Gathered and Sent "The Church – Our Place of Worship"

Church is a place where God reveals God's-self to us and instructs us (Acts 2:14-37). When we worship God on Sunday mornings, we encounter God directly and God also comes to us through those worshipping with us. As we praise and worship God on Sundays; as we grow in our faith in Sunday school; as we fellowship together before and after worship — in all these ways, God is at work for our good.

Would we approach church differently if we knew Christ was waiting to meet us at the door of our church each week? He is! And Christ has the power to change our lives for the better. Some people can't physically make it to church. God knows that and understands.

April 26 – Fourth Sunday of Easter Story #4 - The People of God Gathered and Sent

"The Church— Where We Grow in Faith"

Acts 2:42 states, "They devoted themselves to the apostle's teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and to prayer."

And Acts 46, "Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people."

As we worship, attend Sunday school and Bible studies, participate in small groups, and serve together at church, we help each other grow in faith.

We learn that we're an important part of the body of Christ; we discover the spiritual gifts God has given us; and we learn to share them with others to build up the body.

More and more we learn and see how God created us to live in such a community.

I would like to begin by thanking the church for the Hero's Club bulletin board that is now upstairs in the social room! Please stop by and check out what we have been up to.



Imagine No Malaria


Have you ever had a mosquito bite? Most of us have. Fortunately few of us in the United States contracted malaria from our mosquito bite, because our mosquito does not carry the deadly bacteria.

In other countries, the residents are not so fortunate. One such country is Guinea, on the continent of Africa. Half of the 12 million people of Guinea have no access to health centers, and may die unreported. In 2013, some 15,000 Guineans died from malaria. 14,000 of them were younger than 5 years old. Malaria is the leading cause of death in those younger than 5 in Guinea, and, after AIDS, the leading cause of adult deaths.

Early symptoms of malaria are fever, chills, headaches, and nausea. Left untreated, malaria causes convulsions, coma, organ failure and death. Because these symptoms are very similar to those of Ebola, which has killed over 1600 Guineans, Guineans are scared to go to the available health facilities. Doctors are hesitant to do finger prick blood tests to diagnose malaria. Patients are sometimes turned away from centers if they have Ebola-like symptoms. These malaria deaths can be eliminated, through prevention, education, communication and treatment. The "Imagine No Malaria" effort of the United Methodist Church aims to do just that.

Salem had committed to raising \$1620 for "Imagine No Malaria". There is a display in the church foyer with "mosquitoes" on a net (see above photo). For each \$40 contributed, a mosquito will be swatted from the net. Thus far, 12 mosquitoes have been swatted—we have 29 to go before December 31, 2015.
