Farmers set aside an "acre" of land to grow a vegetable crop that could be donated and then sold to benefit the church. Some farmers even raised livestock to donate. Those who did not farm made fancy needlework or craft items to donate.

Salem's first Lord's Acre included fresh and canned produce and fruit, fancy needlework items, food, live music, and an auction of unsold items at the end. The youth fellowship made posters and signs to advertise the event and decorated the old Wolfsville School building with colored leaves, corn shocks, pumpkins, etc.

Forty-six years ago, in 1970, the event was moved to the Wolfsville Ruritan Park. Being smaller everything fit under the large pavilion.

The move to the park, being mostly outside, as opposed to being in the heated school house, caused the date to be moved to early September.

The first few years at the park, the starting time was 5 p.m.; the same as it had been at the old school house. As the crowds increased though, and began arriving earlier, it was harder to hold people off from buying earlier, so the start time was moved up to 4 p.m. And with the larger crowds, more parking was provided on the ball field at the park. Prior to that, they parked in the small lot and along the road, and were lined up down the road on both sides.

Use of Lord's Acre profits

We have accomplished a lot since that first Lord's Acre 56 years ago. The profits from this annual event have allowed us to enhance the ministry at Salem and support the Wolfsville community.

Over the years, profits from the Lord's Acre have made possible the educational building (1967),parsonage (1974-75), the parking lot and its many improvements and additions (1968, 1993, 1998, and 2007), and many smaller maintenance and improvement projects to our existing buildings and grounds.

During the last 14 years, conditioning was installed in sanctuary; an elevator, handicap restroom, storage rooms, and new flooring were installed; the church steeple was restored; interior and exterior



painting was completed; repaired sanctuary floor understructure; repaired and waterproofed classroom walls; renovated the parsonage; purchased new refrigerator and freezer for the kitchen; replaced stucco on sanctuary exterior walls; constructed new concrete floor under the sanctuary; replaced windows in educational building and parsonage; replaced spouting on parsonage; installed central air and additional insulation in the parsonage; updated the sanctuary sound system; replaced kitchen floor in parsonage; and renovated the social hall with new carpet, painted walls, and new window treatment.

Successful Fundraiser

As of this writing, this year's income totaled \$17,883.40. With some expenses yet to be paid, a full report, indicating the amount of profit, will be published in next month's newsletter. Profits will be in Salem's Building Improvement Fund.

The success of this event is a time of praise to our Lord and a time when we experience warm fellowship among friends and neighbors.

Apple Crunch

4 cups peeled, sliced apples 3/4 cup flour
1/2 cup water 1 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup butter

"Christ Can Be Your Best Friend"

In fact, count Christ first among your true friends because no one else can come close to the friendship our Lord and Savior can provide. Celebrating – Christ is there. Suffering – Christ is there. Alone – Christ is still there with you. Even when you try to hide or turn your back and run in the opposite direction, Christ is still there. Why? Simply because Christ

adores you and there's nothing you can do to change that.

October 18 Christ Can Change Your Life Sermon Series "How to Say 'Yes' to Christ"

At some point, we come to a crossroads in life to say "yes" to Christ. Saying "yes" isn't necessarily the day we're baptized. Saying "yes" isn't necessarily the day we publicly claim, "I believe in Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior."

Saying "yes" is the day we surrender our lives over to Christ's Lordship and strive for the remainder of our lives to follow Christ and to become more and more like Christ in our thoughts, words, and actions. It's the day we decide to die to self, and live in Christ.

It is a matter not of the mind and the intellect (I believe in you Lord!) but a matter of the mind and heart (I believe and I surrender myself to you Lord!).

What happens when we say "yes" to Christ? We begin to truly live!

John Wesley had already been a minister for years before he said "yes." He had said, "I believe" a long time ago, but he had not surrendered himself to Christ. He had not died to self.

Sometimes the final surrender of self comes with a failure in life. Wesley had extraordinary success bringing people to Christ in 18th century England. He thought he could do the same converting the Native Americans in the Colonial America. It was a dismal failure.

One night after his return to England, Wesley was attending a prayer meeting on Aldersgate Street in London. During a reading of Luther's commentary on the Book of Romans, Wesley reports that his heart was strangely warmed.

Through a power he knew was beyond his own (the power of God, the Holy Spirit), he was assured that Christ died for him personally, John Wesley, sinner that he was.

From then on, Wesley experienced the fullness of peace and joy and fulfillment of life that comes from God when we say "yes."




