Turning "shoe boxes" into Christmas gifts for children

Share the love of Jesus, through the power of a simple gift, with children around the world.

We will once again be participating in OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD, in which we fill shoe boxes to be distributed to needy children around the world. This is a project of Samaritan's Purse, a Franklin Graham ministry in Boone, North Carolina.

HOW TO PACK YOUR BOX

We are asking anyone wishing to participate in this program to fill their shoe boxes at home and bring them to the church on or before Sunday, November 15th.

Your shoe boxes should be packed for children ranging in ages from 2-4 years old, 5-9 years old, or 10-14 years old.

Numerous shoe boxes have already been wrapped and are available outside the sanctuary, or you can wrap your own shoe box. Labels are available at church to place in the box, identifying if the items inside are for

a boy or girl, and the appropriate age group.

Once we have filled our boxes, we will take them to a local distribution center where they will then be sent to another distribution center in North Carolina, and then will be sent out to the children.

POSTAGE

There is a \$7.00 postage charge for each box. Place the postage amount in the donation envelope and place the envelope on top of the gift items inside the box so it is clearly visible. Checks should be made payable to Samaritan's Purse, with a note on the memo line that the gift is for Operation Christmas Child. If you are unable to pay the postage, Salem will pick up this cost from our Mission Project No. 2.




Just 5 More Mosquitos!


◆ Electronically Online (Safe & Secure)

RECIPE



Pumpkin Torte

1 3/4 cups graham cracker crumbs

1/3 cup sugar

8 tablespoons margarine, melted

2 eggs

3/4 cup sugar

8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened 2 cups cooked pumpkin

3 egg yolks

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup milk

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1/4 cup cold water

3 egg whites

1/4 cup sugar

8-oz. container whipped topping

1. Combine graham cracker crumbs, 1/3 cup sugar, and melted margarine and pat into $9"\ x\ 13"$ baking pan for crust.

- 2. Beat together eggs, 3/4 cup sugar and cream cheese. Spoon over crust.
- 3. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes or until bubbly.
- 4. In a saucepan combine pumpkin, egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, milk, salt, and cinnamon and bring to a boil.
- 5. Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Add to pumpkin mixture and cool slightly.
- Beat egg whites until stiffened. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar and beat well. Fold into pumpkin mixture. Spoon pumpkin mixture over cream cheese layer. Refrigerate.
- 7. Immediately before serving, top with whipped topping and cut into squares.



November 1 – All Saints Day Holy Communion "Journeying with the Saints" Hebrews 12:1-3

Hebrews 11 cites the faith of one saint after another. Then Hebrews 12 begins, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance, the race marked out for us."

The saints that have gone before us live on in us, helping us run our race, as we will live on in those who come after us to help them run their race with perseverance.

We are not alone. God is with us. A powerful way God is with us is through



the great cloud of saints - past, present, and future.

November 8 "Inviting Another" Acts 1:21-26

One of the first actions of the Apostles after Jesus' ascension into heaven was to return to Jerusalem and elect an apostle to replace Judas Iscariot who had taken his own life.

Near the beginning of his ministry Jesus had appointed twelve to serve with him. The Apostles thought it right to restore the number twelve to begin their ministry (Acts 1:21-26).

As the number of Christians in Jerusalem grew from 120 (Acts 1:15) to 3,000 (Acts 2:41) and eventually to tens of thousands all across the known world, it became necessary for all Christians to be engaged in ministry to one another. When we invite another person to serve with us, we're following a practice first established by Jesus – inviting another.

November 15 "The Power of a Pledge" Mark 12:41-44

We notice in the story of the "Widow's Offering" that Jesus sat down to observe how people gave their offering at church. It's as though Jesus is saying to us, "I want you to observe this with me

and learn." What we observe in this Bible story is what displeases God – people that don't think through what they ought to give back to God financially.

This is in contrast to what pleases God – the poor widow who appears to have given much thought to what she will offer back to God with her "two very small copper coins."

When we take time to work with God to determine what we're going to give in our weekly offering for the upcoming year and make a pledge to God that we'll strive to give that amount, we're like the widow who gave, in the way that is pleasing to God.

November 22 – Christ the King Sunday "A Kingdom Not of this World" John 18:33-37

This is the final Sunday of the current year in the life of the Christian church. Every year the church sets aside this last Sunday as a special time to celebrate Christ our King. How fitting.

We have much to celebrate! Jesus reveals God to us. Jesus teaches how to live. Jesus redeems us from sin and death. Jesus brings us together as the church to continue his work. Jesus sends the Holy Spirit to empower us to follow him and become more like him. Jesus promises to come again to defeat evil for all time and restore all creation to perfection.

Christ our King is indeed deserving of our daily thanks and praise today and every day. Shortly before he was put to death, Jesus said to Pontius Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world."

As we live on earth for a while, let us live as kingdom people, following Christ our King.

November 29 – First Sunday of Advent "Standing before Jesus" Luke 21:25-36

Each year, the theme of the First Sunday in Advent is Jesus proclaiming the end of time. Jesus said, "There will be signs...," "nations will be perplexed...," "people will faint from fear...," and Jesus will be seen "coming in a cloud with power and great glory" (Luke 21: 25-27).

We are instructed to "be always on the watch, and pray that you will be able to stand before the Son of Man" (Luke 21:36). Today, on the first Sunday of the new year in the life of our church, we have the opportunity to stand before Jesus – to pledge our time, our talents, and our financial giving to his service.


