Dear Salem United Methodist Church:

We have been working with Nicaraguan youth for four years through the Nicaragua Youth Leadership Team. The youth are mentored with the goal of becoming leaders in their families, churches and communities.

We are also involved in remote communities along the Rio Bocay, helping villagers build schools

for their children and access clean water. In one of the communities, the villagers are building a clinic/training center.

I (Ronnie) am making monthly trips to the river and usually take several members of the youth leadership team with me. The youth team planned a trip for April 10-15. They plan to work with the children and teachers in the schools and to help with the construction of the clinic/training center.

We are very proud of these young people and believe this will be an enriching experience, both for them and for the villagers they will be serving.

The Board of Trustees has had a busy early spring so far and are continuing to look forward to various activities and projects around our facilities. Thanks to all who bring various issues and requests to our attention so they can be evaluated and taken care of in a timely fashion.

We had a good turnout of adults and several of our youths to help prepare and make ready the cemetery for summer mowing. It was uplifting to see our youth participating in the care of the final resting place for those that have gone on before us. The Trustees would like to thank everyone who showed up and helped to get our cemetery cleaned up. Several head stones will need some repairs and Vernon Stottlemyer and Dick Kline are formulating a plan to address those that can be repaired.

Recent highlighted accomplishments include:

- · Carpet cleaning of social hall and sanctuary were completed Saturday, the 27th of February.
- · New under the counter filing cabinet for Middle/High school Sunday school class was purchased.
- · Cemetery spring cleanup was completed April 7th.
- · Laying out and marking of plots in the new section of the cemetery was completed April 7th.

Future Projects being looked at:

- · Air conditioners will be installed in the Sunday school area soon.
- · Cleaning out under the stairway to lower Sunday school area will be coordinated in the near
- Feasibility of adding Wi-Fi to the sanctuary, Sunday school and social hall areas is moving forward. Recommendation to the Church Council will be made soon on findings and recommendations.

PENTECOST SUNDAY MAY 15, 2016

May 8 "Jesus Prayed for Me" John 17:20-26

In the Gospel of John, do you know the last thing Jesus did before he was arrested?

Jesus prayed for all believers. Jesus says, "I pray also for those who will believe in me..." (John 17:21b).

In this passage, Jesus prays for unity — that we are one with God, one with each other, and one in bringing others to Christ and church.

Sometimes we need to be reminded of our limits and sometimes God uses the least likely in our lives to remind us.

We tend to forget that happiness doesn't come as a result of getting something we don't have, but rather of recognizing and appreciating what we do have.


