The VBS focused on verses from the Psalms that led to the Bible points above. There were songs, skits, Bible videos, stories and activities, as well as crafts, recreation and refreshments each evening.

I would like to thank all the students and their parents for attending, along with the leaders and helpers who faithfully presented the lessons and led the activities.

Cumberland-Hagerstown District Charge Conference Schedule Announced

LOCAL CHARGE CONFERENCE to be HELD at SALEM on OCTOBER 4th

The Cumberland-Hagerstown District Superintendent, Rev. Conrad Link, has announced the Fall 2016 Cluster Charge Conference Schedule.

Salem will host this year's charge conference. Eight local United Methodist churches in our area will come together at Salem on Tuesday evening, October 4, 2016, at 7:00 p.m.

Penny Gaver, District Administrator, will attend and will review each church's paperwork to ensure completeness. Some specific paperwork must be submitted electronically prior to the meeting.

The following meeting agenda will be followed:

- 1. Pastors should arrive with paperwork, completed and signed, 30 minutes prior to the start of the meeting, so Penny can review it for completeness. The Charge Conference will affirm action, vote on the Pastor's compensation for 2017, and vote to accept the entire Charge Conference report.
- 2. At 7 p.m. we will have a brief devotional moment, prayer, introductions and then begin.
- 3. Each church will share a highlight or two from the previous year, lasting from 3-5 minutes. Each church will then spend a few more minutes sharing goals, plans, dreams for Prepared remarks are strongly 2017.

encouraged.

4. Following each church's presentation and voting, the District Superintendent would like to engage in a large group discussion of current needs, ministry potentials, and community concerns.

5. We will begin promptly at 7 p.m. and we should be walking out the door no later than 8:30 p.m.

Preparation for Charge Conference by Pastor Bob and Salem church officers is rather extensive. The following reports must be completed and submitted to the conference: Certified Lay Minister's Report, Pastor's Compensation (salary, travel, medical, pension, etc.), Clergy Sexual Misconduct Form, Disability Audit, Finance Report, Lay Servant Annual Report, Membership Report, Nominations for 2017 Church Officers, Parsonage Report, Pastor's Report, Trustees Report, List of all Candidates for Ordained Ministry (Recommendation and/or Renewal), and Certified Lay Minister(s) and Lav Servant(s).

Preparation of the reports and other paperwork will begin soon. Everyone at Salem is invited to attend charge conference.



RECIPE



Cranberry and Vanilla Chip Cookies

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened 1 cup old-fashioned rolled oats
- 1 1/3 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup refrigerated or frozen fat-free 1/2 teaspoon salt egg product, thawed; or 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon imitation butter flavor
- 1 3/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 cup sweetened dried cranberries
- 2/3 cup white vanilla chips

Directions

- 1. Heat oven to 350°F. Spray cookie sheets with nonstick cooking spray. In large bowl, combine margarine and sugar; beat until light and fluffy. Add egg product and butter flavor; mix well. Add flour, oats, baking soda and salt; mix well. Stir in cranberries and vanilla chips. Drop dough by tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart onto sprayed cookie sheets.
- 2. Bake at 350°F, for 9 to 11 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheets. Cool on wire racks 15 minutes or until completely cooled.

NOTE: You may substitute raisins, currants or chopped dried apricots for the dried cranberries. Yields 4 dozen cookies.

Letter from Frank and Nancy Stottlemyer

Retired, New Tribes Mission, Senegal, West Africa

Dear Folks at Salem United Methodist Church:

July 12, 2016— Thank you so much for your continued support for us in prayer and through your gifts. We greatly appreciate your faithfulness.

Nancy and I are both doing well as far as our health. We tire out much more easily than we used to, but I guess that is just part of getting older! We are thankful that we can continue to be busy.

Since moving into our "new" house in March, there have been a lot of things that needed attention; some in the house and some in the yard. So we've worked at lot toward doing those things and we've made a lot of progress. We are well settled in; adjusting and enjoying our new location.

Nancy is back to doing volunteer work at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission,

but instead of three days a week she is only working there two days a week. She continues to visit several widows regularly along with doing other things at church. We both helped with Vacation Bible School last month. There were a number of children who professed faith in Christ for salvation.

Frank continues to serve on the board of our home church, serve as the church treasurer and serves in other ways at our home church and in other ways. Today our pastor, we members of the church board, and our wives are taking some widows and widowers for lunch and a time of fellowship.

Our son-in-law, Lynn Harney, continues to minister at the Hagerstown Rescue Mission as well as working at FedEx at night.

Our son, Eric & his wife Wendy came to the U.S. last month for home



assignment for six months. They have been teaching the Bible to the Badyaranké people in Senegal. Please be praying for those people, and especially for those who became Christians over the past year or two

Our daughter, Rebecca, picked up her ministry of literacy and visiting among the Badyaranké people when she got back to the village in April. For the next few months she is in charge of a mission guest home in the far east of Senegal.


