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Operation Christmas Child

A PROJECT of SAMARITAN'S PURSE

Turning "shoe boxes" into Christmas gifts for children

Share the love of Jesus, through the power of a simple gift, with children around the world.

We will once again be participating in OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD, in which we fill shoe boxes to be distributed to needy children around the world. This is a project of Samaritan's Purse, a Franklin Graham ministry in Boone, North Carolina.

HOW TO PACK YOUR BOX

We are asking anyone wishing to participate in this program to fill their shoe boxes at home and bring them to the church on or before Sunday, November 15th.

Your shoe boxes should be packed for children ranging in ages from 2-4 years old, 5-9 years old, or 10-14 years old.

Numerous shoe boxes have already been wrapped and are available outside the sanctuary, or you can wrap your own shoe box. Labels are available at church to place in the box, identifying if the items inside are for Boxes are due by Sunday, November 13, 2016

a boy or girl, and the appropriate age group.

Once we have filled our boxes, we will take them to a local distribution center where they will then be sent to another distribution center in North Carolina, and then will be sent out to the children.

POSTAGE

There is a \$7.00 postage charge for each box. Place the postage amount in the donation envelope and place the envelope on top of the gift items inside the box so it is clearly visible. Checks should be made payable to Samaritan's Purse, with a note on the memo line that the gift is for Operation Christmas Child. If you are unable to pay the postage, Salem will pick up this cost from our Mission Project No. 2.



Apple Muffins

Ingredients

2 cups sifted flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons granulated sugar 2 eggs 3/4 cup cold milk 1/4 cup melted butter

3/4 cup peeled and finely chopped apples 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon or nutmeg

3 tablespoons granulated sugar mixed with 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon for topping Butter or jam (optional)

Directions

In a large mixing bowl sift the flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Add the eggs, milk, and melted butter all at once and stir until well moistened. Do not overbeat—the batter should be lumpy and rough. Fold in the apples and the cinnamon and pour into buttered muffin pans. Fill only 2/3 full to allow for baking expansion. Sprinkle cinnamon sugar on top of each muffin and bake in a preheated 400 degree oven for 20-25 minutes. Serve hot with lots of butter or jam. Makes 20-24 muffins.

Advent begins on Sunday, November 27th, and with it, the beginning of a new sermon series called "52."



November 6 All Saints Sunday, Holy Communion "God Helps Us Believe" Luke 20: 27-38

The Sadducees were the privileged in Jesus' day. They did not believe in the resurrection of the body, and one day a group of them challenged Jesus about it.

Their sacred writings were the Torah, the first five books of our Bible (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy).

Knowing their deep trust in the Torah, Jesus quoted verses from it to convince this group of Sadducees that the resurrection is true.

Knowing us as well as he does, God finds the ways we can understand to convince us of his truths.

November 13 "God Calls Us, Then Sustains Us" Luke 21: 5-19

In these verses Jesus reveals what is coming, and reassures his disciples that he will provide for them and they will succeed.

We sense God calling us to grow in faith and service to others. We want to respond but sometimes we're afraid to do so. "Is this really God's will?" we question. "Can I succeed at what God seems to be asking of me? Do I have the time and the energy?"

God doesn't ask us to neglect our responsibilities, risk our health, or

needlessly strain our relationships to be his disciple. God does call us to grow and serve, then God provides what we need to succeed. God is calling us right now.

November 20 Christ the King Sunday "Our Hope Is In Jesus" Luke 23: 33-43

Perhaps the best example of irony was the day of Jesus' death. As he suffered, so many different groups mocked Jesus. The rulers sneered at him, saying "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the chosen One" (Luke 23:35).

The soldiers mocked him, saying "If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself" (Luke 23:37). The notice which hung above him was written with sarcasm, "This is the King of the Jews" (Luke 23:38). Even the criminal who hung on the cross beside Jesus yelled at him, "Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us!" (Luke 23:39).

We know now what they had failed to see: Jesus is the King! We place our hope in Jesus.

November 23 Community Thanksgiving Service 7 p.m. at Salem

We come together as a community to praise God as our first act of the Thanksgiving holiday. This year, the service is being held at Salem. A community choir will sing "Together in Thanksgiving."

November 27 First Sunday in Advent "52" Sermon Series Week 1 – "You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come when you do not expect him." (Luke 12:40).

On this first Sunday in Advent, we once again begin our year-long cycle of worship: Advent Season, Christmas Day and the Christmas Season, Epiphany, Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter Day and the Easter Season, Pentecost, Ordinary Time and, finally, Christ the King Sunday.

During the next 52 weeks we'll explore 52 Bible verses that tell God's love story in one year.

On this first week, we'll look at Luke 12:40, where Jesus promises to return a final time. In this verse, Jesus teaches us to "be ready."

A Tribute to Lorraine Ruth Barkdoll

Life-Long Salem Member Remembered for Faith and Dedication

Lorraine R. Barkdoll, 88, of Black Rock Road, passed away Friday, October 14, 2016, at Meritus Medical Center, Hagerstown.

Lorraine was born November 7, 1927, in Wolfsville. She was the daughter of the late Sherman and Florence Kline. She was preceded in death by her husband, Donnie, of 59 years, on April 10, 2004.

Lorraine and Donnie were blessed with four children, two boys and two girls: Donnie Jr., Gary, Linda, and Sharon; 11 grandchildren, 9 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on October 19, 2016, at Salem United Methodist Church with Pastor Bob Snyder officiating. Burial was in Salem Cemetery.

At the funeral, Pastor Bob spoke of Lorraine and the Barkdoll Family.

Recounting Lorraine's early years, Pastor Bob said, "Donnie Barkdoll and Lorraine were neighbors. Their parent's farms were right beside each other. Donnie and Lorraine married and remained together in marriage for 59 years until his death in 2004.

"Lorraine grew up on a farm during the depression. People worked hard to make a living and without many of the modern conveniences we have today. She attended Wolfsville School, located right across the parking lot where the parsonage sets now. She attended school through the 7th grade. Donnie went through the 5th grade. She was 17 and he was 18 when they were married.

"For many years, they lived and worked as tenant farmers, making a living and providing for their growing family.


"Lorraine and Donnie are an example of 'opposites attract.' She was more the task master, more the disciplinarian of the two. He the more easy going type."

Pastor Bob continued, "Most of you know, bless her heart, Lorraine could carry on a conversation. I'd visit with her, as you would, and she'd get herself going and go from one thought or story to another and a good bit of time would be passing by and you weren't sure how you could politely bring the visit to a close. It was easy for Lorraine to have a lot to say.

"Over the time I've known her, Lorraine seems to me to be a good example of someone who was working out her faith with God. She had losses – the sudden death of her adult son "little Donnie." Then the passing of "big Donnie," after 59 year of marriage. Maybe it was these losses that caused her to become very anxious. People handle crises differently. Your little crises can be a big one to me. We're all different. And she had a good number of other health concerns: a heart condition, arthritis, constant headaches that hounded her, and other complications.

"But like I said, I feel all the while she was working out her faith with God's help. She'd watch worship services and Bible teaching on the T.V. She kept her favorite picture of Jesus constantly by her side, and would touch it as a way of staying close to God, and God's love and care.

"Lorraine would spend a good bit of time during our visits talking about Jesus, how much our Lord does for us, and how fortunate she was to be loved and cared for by Jesus. People who know her well say that over her lifetime they saw how she



grew in her understanding of and relationship with God. Isn't that what God asks of all of us.

"Whenever I'd finish my prayer and get ready to leave after a visit with Lorraine, she would always say in a very sincere way, 'thank you very much for coming.'

"Lorraine, thank you very much for being in our lives and for all that you have done for us and continue to do. We miss you already, but we're also happy you are home with "big" Donnie and "little" Donnie and all your other loved ones that have gone before. We're happy you don't have to suffer any longer – those bad headaches are now completely gone - and we're happy that your picture of Jesus that you kept by your bedside has now been replaced by the Lord himself. You are with the Lord now. You have your reward of eternal life and we are very happy for you. Thank you, Lorraine."


