**RECIPE** Mint Crinkles

#### Ingredients

\*

- 3/4 cup finely chopped layered chocolate-mint candies
- (about 4 ounces or 24 candies)
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons vanilla 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour Layered chocolate-mint candies, chopped

2 eggs

1/4 teaspoon salt

- Directions
- 1. In a small heavy saucepan, heat and stir the 3/4 cup chopped candies until melted and smooth. Remove from heat. Cool about 15 minutes.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, beat shortening with an electric mixer on medium to high for 30 seconds. Add sugar, baking powder, and salt; beat until combined. Beat in melted candies, eggs, and vanilla. Stir in flour. Cover; chill for 3 hours or until dough is easy to handle.
- 3. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Using about 1 tablespoon dough per ball, shape dough into 1 1/4-inch balls. Place balls 2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake about 10 minutes or until edges are set (tops should crackle). Sprinkle a few candy pieces on each cookie; do not press candies into cookies. Bake for 1 minute more. Cool on wire racks.

#### To Store

Layer cookies between sheets of waxed paper in an airtight container; cover. Store at room temperature for up to 24 hours or freeze for up to 3 months. Makes 36 cookies.

February 5 Fruits of the Spirit – "Joy" John 14:15-27 Galatians 5:22 Worship Leader and Preacher: Bill Burrier

Earlier in this sermon series, we affirmed that God is all-loving and allknowing. These characteristics allow God to know what is righteous (the right thing as seen by God) and just. God's righteousness and justice are embodied in the life and ministry of Jesus Christ.

"Then a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and a voice came from the cloud: 'This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!'" (Mark 17:7).

I do believe God is making his will known to us. To Peter, James and John, God said in so many words, "Jesus is my beloved Son and your Lord whom I sent to lead you through life. Now listen to him!"

To hear God's will, we need to remain close to him.

And when we talk with God (pray), we need not only to speak but also to listen: to listen for God to give us exactly what we prayed for; to listen for an answer that might be different than what we prayed for, but best for us; to keep on watching and listening when it doesn't seem like God is giving us any answers.

#### Looking Back at the Years 1937-1938

### Should we install electricity in the church?

Salem has a long rich history in the Wolfsville community and we are pleased to be able to add some additional content to our historical records.

Recently, Salem member Fonda Gormer provided some very interesting facts from the diary of Cecil R. Martin, written by Cecil in 1937-1938, about electricity coming to Wolfsville.

In the spring of 1937, Wolfsville residents began to talk about when Potomac Edison would run their electric line from the village of Ellerton to Wolfsville. Cecil, who was a member of Salem's Official Board, met with a Potomac Edison representative on April 22, 1937, who said the "light line" is coming to Wolfsville. In fact, it was scheduled to go as far as the Lutheran Church.

Three months later, in July 1937, Wolfsville residents, businesses, and churches were deciding whether to install electric lights and connect to the Potomac Edition wires. The first Wolfsville resident to connect was Asa Stotelmyer.

Salem's pastor, Rev. D. R. Fair, and Salem's Official Board had discussed whether or not to have electric lights installed in the church at their April 7, 1937, meeting, and again on July 18, 1937. At the July meeting, the Board made a decision not to install electric lights in the church. The reason being "the church is far behind with its current expenses and cannot afford to take upon itself this additional expense."

Eight months later, in March 1938, Salem's Official Board decided to serve as a committee to solicit money for installing electric lights in the church. At this point, Salem was the only church in Wolfsville without electric lights. On one day, within 3 hours, their solicitation efforts yielded \$38. The largest contribution was \$10, with others ranging \$5 or less. Total cost of the project was estimated at \$50 or \$60. Solicitation for additional money continued, hoping to have the lights ready for use by Easter.

With about half of the money either in hand or promised, the Board decided in late March 1938, to have Asa Stotelmyer do the wiring. Asa offered to do his part of the work free but the church was determined to give him something.

The next decision was the type of light shades to purchase. The group decided on shades (stained glass globes), six of them, which must be specially ordered, and will retail for \$12 each; although Asa is only charging the church half that amount. Also purchased were cable, switches, a meter box, and chain hangers.

At the next Board meeting on April 10, 1938, it was decided to borrow enough money out of the Sunday School treasury to finish paying for the electric light job when it is finished; and to ask



the Christian Endeavor Society (youth group) to pay 50 cents a month toward the light bill. It appears the Christian Endeavor Society declined to pay, although they were the first group to make use of the electric lights in the church.

By mid April, 1938, the installation of wiring, switches, etc. were complete; as well as the ceiling lights, which used 300 watt bulbs.

When describing the ceiling lights, Cecil's diary entry on April 16, 1938, says the lighted globes "make a gorgeous appearance. They are truly one of the loveliest sights I have ever seen."

Three weeks later, the inspector came to inspect the electric light system in the church and Asa had to make a number of changes before the inspector would approve the job.

On May 10, 1938, Asa presented his bill for the electric light job. The figures read \$90.50, with \$75.00 of that already paid. The bill was a few dollars higher than expected, so the church will need to get hold of some more money somewhere.

On May 22, 1938, the church received its first electric bill. The Board seemed to think it was not at all too high.

We welcome back all of our regular singers and any folks who would like to join us.




