



## RECIPE



## **Cranberry & Vanilla Chip Cookies**

- 1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened
- 1 1/3 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup refrigerated or frozen fatfree egg product, thawed, or 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon imitation butter flavor
- 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup old-fashioned rolled oats
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sweetened dried cranberries 2/3 cup white vanilla chips

## **Directions**

- Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spray cookie sheets with non-stick cooking spray. In large bowl, combine margarine and sugar; beat until light and fluffy. Add egg product and butter flavor; mix well. Add flour, oats, baking soda and salt; mix well. Stir in cranberries and vanilla chips. Drop dough by tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart onto sprayed cookie sheets.
- Bake at 350 degrees for 9 to 11 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheets. Cool on wire racks 15 minutes or until completely cooled.

Yield: 4 dozen cookies.

Notes: You may substitute raisins, currants or chopped dried apricots for the dried cranberries. Also, fat-free egg product is actually real egg whites with a bit of coloring and flavoring to compensate for the lack of a yolk. It's available frozen or in the dairy section of the supermarket.



# December 3 First Sunday of Advent Sermon Series: Faithful – Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph <sup>1</sup> "A Carpenter Named Joseph"

Our Advent and Christmas Sermon Series, "Faithful – Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph," is based on Adam Hamilton's book of the same title.

Matthew 13:54-55 - "Coming to his hometown, he began teaching the people in the synagogue, and they were amazed. 'Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers?' they asked. 'Isn't he the carpenter's son?'"



We detect sarcasm in these words. "How could this man, with these powers, come from a mere carpenter?"

But that was exactly God's intention. So many times God uses the ordinary to accomplish his purposes.

Joseph was everything God needed to raise up Jesus to be our Savior. You and I, ordinary ourselves, are exactly who God desires to raise up the next generation to be sons and daughters of God.

# December 10 Second Sunday of Advent Sermon Series: Faithful – Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph <sup>1</sup> "Whose Child Is This?"

Matthew 1:18-19 - "This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly."

The angel who would later come to reassure Joseph had not yet arrived. At this point, Joseph felt only brokenness and betrayal. Nevertheless, he reached out to Mary with grace, mercy, and forgiveness. We see these same qualities in Jesus. He learned them from Joseph.

As we learn to extend grace, mercy and forgiveness to others, we find more and more of the fullness of life.

# December 17 Third Sunday of Advent Sermon Series: Faithful – Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph <sup>1</sup> "Raising a Child Not Your Own"

Matthew 20-21 – "As he was thinking about this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, because the child she carries was conceived by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you will call him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.""

This third Sunday of Advent is traditionally known as "Joy Sunday," shown by the rose-colored advent candle. An angel came to Joseph bringing comfort and courage.

Angels come into our lives also, and we are angels to others as God's comfort and courage are given and received.

Through our angels, God calls us to go beyond our comfort zones to grow and serve. God calls all of us to help raise a child, not our own, as a stepfather or adoptive parent or as a Sunday school teacher or other servant.

Responding to God's call to step out in faith brings joy into our lives.

# December 24 Fourth Sunday of Advent Sermon Series: Faithful – Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph <sup>1</sup> "The Journey to Bethlehem"

Luke 2:3-5 – "Everyone went to their own cities to be enrolled. Since Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant."

The journey to Bethlehem was not a journey Joseph wanted to take. The

Roman authorities had ordered it, so Joseph had to go. He took Mary with him because he felt compelled to remain close to Mary and their child to protect them.

Like all of us, I'm sure Joseph took other journeys in life he didn't want to take and in doing so he modeled for Jesus the importance of trusting that God is with us and takes care of us in such times.

Learning this from Joseph must have helped Jesus on the journey he didn't want to take - the one to his death on the

On those journeys we don't want to take, God reassures us, "Give me your worries and cares, I will walk with you. Trust in me, I will not let you fail."

## December 31 First Sunday after Christmas Sermon Series: Faithful - Christmas through the Eyes of Joseph 1 "The Rest of the Story"

Luke 2:21 - "On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise him, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him when he was conceived."

Joseph and Mary were practicing their faith when they had Jesus circumcised,

similar to our practice of baptism. They passed their faith onto Jesus.

Joseph hosted both the lowliest shepherds and the loftiest wise men who came to worship the new born Jesus. He must have taught Jesus that God's love takes in all people.

Jesus' own family became refugees when they escaped to Egypt. Perhaps it was the gifts from the wise men that paid their expenses during those hard times.

Joseph remained faithful, built relationships with people unlike himself, and experienced being a refugee.

Joseph must have learned much that he passed on to his son about these life experiences in which God seeks to find us and care for us.

This is the promise we're reminded of at Christmas - that God is on a mission to search for us, find us, and love and care for us.

## Mary is Redirecting her Mission Work from Chad to France

October 26, 2017 FRANCE —

Mary is redirecting her mission work to Europe, but she first needed to return to Chad to say goodbye.

## Goodbyes in Chad

I'm writing this newsletter in France, just an hour's train ride from Paris. When I last wrote, I was on my way to Chad to say goodbye. It was a significant time for me. Over the course of that week, I was able to spend time with friends, both foreigners and locals.

I arrived in the capital on the night of September 5, and the next morning traveled out to D'town, where I spent the next four days. Thank the Lord, the bit of language I had learned came back after the first day – not entirely, but enough to be able to communicate with those around me.

I was able to spend significant time with several friends, both locals and teammates. I hadn't realized the extent to which I had struggled before, until I was back in my house, sitting at the kitchen table and suddenly realized "I'm at peace!" I had been asking the Lord to show me if I was wrong in deciding to not return to Chad, and instead the whole week was a confirmation that this was, indeed, the right step.

It was special to sit with local friends and explain why I was leaving, and to say a proper goodbye. I had asked the Father for opportunities to speak His name, and there were a couple times when I was able to share a Bible verse that I had memorized, and two conversations in French with two believing friends.

It was also important to be able to have significant time with my housemate and other teammates, as well as with other friends in the capital. My time in D'town included a Sunday, so I was also

able to visit an elder on Saturday to inform him of this change in direction, and then to say goodbye to the church on Sunday morning. It was hard to say goodbye, because several people had quickly become very special to me, but I was encouraged by how the Lord surrounded me with His peace and confirmed that this season of living in Africa has come to a close. It was also healing and confirming to talk through this journey with my teammates and my Africa Inland Mission (AIM) leadership.

### On To France

A week and a half after I returned from Chad, I boarded a plane for Athens, Greece, where I attended a conference on reaching out to non-Europeans in Europe (the diaspora). I made a lot of connections, and learned a lot!

On September 30, I arrived in France where I began my own "Tour de France" (but instead of by bike, I've been traveling by train, bus, city bus, tram, metro, and car).

I started in Albertville, where I went to language school, and was able to reconnect with several close friends and the church I attended last year.

From there I visited Chambéry, Marseille, Lyon, and Colmar, before arriving in Paris. Tomorrow I leave for Strasbourg.

The purpose of this month-long tour is to explore ministry opportunities in France that would allow me to stay with Africa Inland Mission, while partnering with other organizations and local churches to reach out to African migrants and refugees, as well as communities of African-origin who have been established in France for years, but who have little Gospel witness.

After Strasbourg I will return to Athens, Greece, to look at one further

opportunity, reaching out to a French-speaking African community.

Please pray that God would give me clear direction as I meet with people, explore ministry possibilities, and process all I've seen, heard, and done.

Pray for renewed strength as well, as this month of travel has been wearying, and I'm starting to get sick.

Most of all, please pray that God would open my eyes to opportunities this week for Gospel-focused conversations.

I'll be back in the United States on November 7, and hopefully not too long after that, I'll have news to share on what's next!

All I can say at this point is that I'm so thankful to be back in France, and I'm excited to see where and how God leads me in this next step.


