Salem's youth will reflect on their experiences at the ROCK Youth Retreat

As this issue of "The Mountain Shepherd" is being published, Salem's middle and high school youth are attending the annual ROCK Youth Retreat in Ocean City, Maryland.

The retreat, which is sponsored by the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, is held at the Ocean City Convention Center. Activities begin on Friday evening, January 26, and end at noon on Sunday, January 28.

Since Friday is a school day, students provided a "religious accommodation note" to their school to obtain an excused absence.

As of this writing, 29 youth and adults are attending the event this year. They left the church parking lot in Wolfsville at 8:30

a.m. Friday morning in a caravan of vehicles driven by the adult advisors. They stopped for breakfast and lunch to break up the fourhour trip to their hotel, the Carousel in Ocean City, where seven rooms have been reserved.

At the convention center, in addition to enjoying the speakers and music, Salem's youth have volunteered to be greeters, wearing their Salem shirts while welcoming other youth groups to the convention center; and they will help with Holy Communion on Sunday morning.

The following Sunday, February 4, is designated as Youth Sunday at Salem, when the youth will lead worship and share their experiences at ROCK.

Pastor Bob and Donna work with



the Breakfast each month and report, "The school staff, PTA, parents, and children really seem to love the breakfasts! Normal attendance is around 65, but has been as high as 85."

The Breakfast is held before school and includes a short program of parenthood and family topics. The February "All Pro Families Breakfast" will be held on February 2nd at 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. in the school cafeteria.

Lenten Devotional available at Salem

The Sanctuary for Lent 2018 · By Rev. Katie Z. Dawson

This year's Lenten devotional (pictured at right) contains brief readings for each day in Lent, from Ash Wednesday (February 14) through Easter Day (April 1).

It includes a brief reading for each day in Lent, a Scripture, and a closing brief prayer. These daily readings will help us faithfully journey through the wilderness of Lent as we prepare to experience the joy of the Resurrection.

The devotional was written by Rev. Katie Z. Dawson, an elder in the United Methodist Church and is currently the lead pastor at Immanuel UMC in Des Moines. At Simpson College she studied communications, religion, and physics and then received her Masters of Divinity from Vanderbilt Divinity School.

What is Lent?

Lent is a period of fasting, moderation, and self-denial traditionally observed by Catholics and some Protestant denominations. It begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. The length of the Lenten fast was established in the 4th century as 46 days (40 days, not counting Sundays).

During Lent, participants eat sparingly or give up a particular food or habit. It's six weeks of self-discipline.

If a Christian wishes to observe Lent, we are free to do so. The key is to focus on repenting of sin and consecrating oneself to God. Lent should not be a time of boasting of one's sacrifice or trying to earn God's favor or increasing His love. God's love for us could not be any greater than it already is.

Frederick Memorial Hospital Bridges Program

Partnership with Salem United Methodist Church

Frederick Memorial Hospital and Salem has partnered in a program called the Bridges Program.

The Bridges Program is an outreach program of the Frederick Regional Health System. It collaborates partnerships with Frederick County's faith-based, cultural, social, senior and service organizations.

The goal is to provide these groups with current information on health, safety, smart decision making and the responsible use of health resources using the services of volunteers called Lay Health Educators.

So far, 42 people from a broad cross section of Frederick's multifaceted community have been trained as Lay Health Educators.

They include volunteers from the Hispanic, African American, Asian Indian, Muslim and Deaf communities. These health advocates are now serving Frederick County's neediest people to improve their access to care. Their goal is to reduce visits to the Emergency Department and providing important information on Advance Directives, stroke identification, heart health, breast

cancer and so much more.

I finished a 10-week course in November to be a certified Lay Health Educator.

I will be conducting monthly instructional workshops at Salem, along with Pattie Hughes, a Registered Nurse and member of Grossnickle Church of Brethren, starting on Monday, February 26th at 7:00 p.m.

These workshops will be free to the community. There will be light, healthy refreshments provided, so everyone will go home with a new recipe for eating healthy! So, mark your calendars!

Salem Mission Project No. 5 Mary prepares for mission work in France



JANUARY 2018 — I returned from my month and a half tour of France and Athens, Greece, in early November. The plan is for me to go to France with Africa Inland Mission (AIM), hopefully in April. Many Africans live in France, especially from North and West Africa, and AIM has been wanting, for some time, to broaden our work among Africans in Europe. There are two other "fields" that the Lord has opened for me in the meantime, and I'm excited to share this news with you!

First of all, I will be going to Kenya from February 12 to March 1. I'll be leading a song composition workshop with believers from several unreached people groups (defined as tribes with less than 5% believers). We'll focus on the purpose of music in Scripture, the use of instruments, the question of using our freedom without being a stumbling block for others, as well as looking at worship itself. The goal of this workshop is twofold: that believers will return to their homes with a better understanding of the place of music and of worship in the Christian's life; and that they would compose (and continue composing) their own worship music from Scripture, in their language and their music.

Secondly, God has provided me with many opportunities to serve Him here in Hatfield, PA. There is a Muslim woman who's actively seeking the Truth. A couple and their two girls are Hindus, and are open to hearing about Jesus. Sisters from North Africa, one is a nominal Muslim while the other and her friend (also North African) have been secret believers for some time, and have been looking for someone to disciple them. And there are more. Please pray that God would move in these relationships for His glory and their salvation. -Mary





February 4 – Youth Sunday Sermon Series: Hope Part 3 – What We Do For Each Other "We Can Witness Our Faith to Others"

John 4:39 – "Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me everything I ever did.'"

If asked the question, "How is God working in your life?" would you have an answer? Do we notice how God is at work in our lives?

One day, a Samaritan woman recognized that Jesus was working in her life. She then shared with her town



what Jesus had done for her. As a result, many of her friends and neighbors came to believe in Jesus.

Souls are saved, lives are changed, and hope is offered when we share with others our own encounters with Jesus.

February 11 –Transfiguration Sunday, Holy Communion Sermon Series: Hope Part 3 – What We Do For Each Other "We Can Invite Others to Christ and Church"

John 5:27 – "After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector by the name of Levi sitting at his booth. 'Follow me,' Jesus said to him, and Levi got up, left everything and followed him."

Jesus invited others to be disciples with him and their work together changed the world.

When we have the commitment and courage to go out beyond ourselves and invite others to Christ and church, we partner with Jesus to offer hope to the world.

February 18 – First Sunday in Lent "First, Know Yourself" Mark 1:9-15

Two of the basic tenants of leadership I was taught are "know yourself" and "know your people."

As we lead others, it's important to know their story and what motivates them. But even before that can happen, an effective leader must know himself or herself.

Following his baptism, Jesus was tested by Satan for forty days. This time of testing helped Jesus know himself. Only then was he equipped to call his first disciples.

Before we can lead – a family, at church, in the workplace, on the playing field – it's important for us to know ourselves. The forty day season of Lent is an excellent time to get to know yourself.

February 25 – Second Sunday in Lent "Carrying Our Cross" Mark 8:31-38

In this story, Jesus instructs his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (8:34).

Deny oneself. We live in a world where many times feeding self seems more and more the goal than denying self. Feeding self of the next possession, the next great experience, the next online post, the next relationship.

But Jesus teaches that taking up one's cross first involves denying ourselves.

Lent is a wonderful opportunity to spend time denying self so we can focus on God, how God is at work, and what God's will is for our lives.

A Tribute to Doris J. Fogle — June 2, 1935 - January 12, 2018

Funeral services for Doris J. Fogle, 82, were held at Salem on January 17, 2018. The following are excerpts from Pastor Bob Snyder's remarks at the funeral.

Doris was born on June 2, 1935, just walking distance from here, at the house on Stottlemyer Road, down by the creek. Most of her life was spent right here in Wolfsville. She first entered this worship space, where we are right now, as a baby in her mother's arms. For all the time I've been here, she always sat in the last pew right near the aisle. As members of Salem, we're asked to commit to be present at church with our church family. Doris was always present.

Her favorite color was red, the color of love. It fits. She loved her family, she loved her church family, and she loved the Wolfsville family. We're better off because she lived among us.

Doris June Fogle, 82, died peacefully last Friday, January 12th, at Broadmore Assisted Living in Hagerstown. She was the wife of the late Robert "Bob" Fogle, who predeceased her in 2009. They were married 53 1/2 years at the time of his death. She was the daughter of the late Richard and Gladys (Shuff) Martin.

As a teenager, the family was living on the farm still located behind Wolfsville Elementary School. Like many kids around here, she'd pick beans in the summer for Paul Kline. Doris fondly remembered those growing up years with family and friends.

Husband Bob's dad, who worked for Ebert's Ice Cream, introduced Bob and Doris. They fell in love and got married and travelled to Niagara Falls for their honeymoon. They lived in Walkersville for the first five years. But Doris missed Wolfsville and wanted to return and Bob graciously supported her, and from then on Wolfsville was their home.

Along came children. Doris would observe, "I had a child every decade for three decades: Lavena, 1958; Bobby, 1960; and Lora, 1971. Husband Bob worked multiple jobs so Doris could stay home and raise the kids. He really wanted that, and she obliged.

Doris loved gardening and canning. She also loved baking. Family favorites were her apple pies, vegetable soup, and chocolate chip cookies. Doris also Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Matthew 11.28

enjoyed reading and spending time with her church family, where she taught Sunday School, sang in the choir, and was one of the children's coordinators for activities for many years.

Lavena, Bobby, and Lora remember their mom and dad being interested in their lives and present at their activities whatever they might be: track, band, chorus and others. Doris was the keeper of the calendar of activities.

There are fond memories of family trips to places like Niagara Falls, Bar Harbor, Maine, and Country Music Shows. They'd get their pictures with the country music stars. Somewhere in the photos, there's one of them with Dolly Parton when she was just starting out.

But perhaps most enjoyable were the frequent cookouts and family gatherings. The kids knew they were loved. They've shared, "we couldn't have asked for better parents."

When asked to describe Doris in a word, people have said the words: gracious, strong, loving, traditional, sacrifice.

Her nurses and hospice care workers shared words like sweet, cheerful, happy. Singing is something this whole family is known for, and it didn't stop these last two years at Broadmore where Doris was known for singing to residents and staff. The family appreciates the efforts of the Broadmore staff in caring for mom.

Doris' life and death reminds us of what a treasure life is and how we need to make the most of our remaining years together.

As well as honoring Doris, today's service also gives us an opportunity to pause and reflect on our own life and our own faith at this time in our lives, and to ask ourselves an important question, "How is my own relationship with God?" Doris believed in Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior, and she's now receiving her reward in heaven. In our lives, are we following Jesus and striving to become more like him?

Are we living our lives to the fullest? Are we continuing to grow as a person and in our faith, no matter what our age?

Are we discovering the ways God has gifted us and are we serving others through those gifts?

Do we trust in God's power to help us? Are we helping those in need around us and inviting others to Christ and to church?

Doris is experiencing eternal life with Christ, with Bob, and her loved ones who have gone on to glory before her. God wants that for all of us.

How is our relationship with God at this time in our lives? Maybe there's something about Doris we've heard about today, or know about her, through our own personal experience with her. Some way we would like to be more like her. Let's not miss this chance to pursue that.

By following her example we will honor her life and she'll live on through us, and, in the process, we'll become a better person.

Finally, I'll end with this. Doris shared with me frequently that about two weeks before Bob died, he told her something that she's treasured ever since. He said to her, "I could have searched the world over and never found a person more perfect than you."


She said that gesture of love sustained her in these years that have followed Bob's death.

A few days ago, son Bobby gave me a copy of the message I gave at his dad's funeral nine years ago. Doris had kept it.

Near the end, I said "Doris has shared with me that's she's confident that Bob went on ahead of her so he could be a help to God in preparing a place for her in heaven."

Now they are together in that place. In our grief, that gives us great comfort. Well done, Doris. Amen.
