Funds will be automatically withdrawn from your checking or savings account. No more checks to write and you may change your giving amount at any time. This is a personal choice. Salem members who have already signed up for electronic giving are pleased with the service.

Central Air Conditioning being installed in Salem's social room and church kitchen

Salem's Board of Trustees recently issued a bid request for installation of central air conditioning in the church's social room and kitchen.

Of the three responses received, Myers Heating and Cooling, Inc., Frederick, MD, was the lowest bidder and was selected to perform the work.

The contractor began work on May 15th. The new system will employ heat pumps which will provide heating and cooling. The room was previously heated by wall-attached electric heaters and cooled with window air conditioning units. (The window units will be installed in classrooms on the lower level.)

Lord's Acre profits will fund the work. Interestingly, 18 years ago, Myers Heating and Cooling also installed the air conditioning system in Salem's sanctuary.



Plant and Food Sale a Great Success

RECIPE Pumpkin Spice Chex Mix 4 cup brown sugar 1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice 2 cups Cinnamon C 2 cups Wheat Chex

1 tablespoon pumpkin pie sp 14 cup butter 2 teaspoons vanilla 2 cups Cinnamon Chex cereal 2 cups Wheat Chex cereal 2 cups Honey Nut Chex cereal 8 ounces pecans

Steps:

In a small bowl, mix brown sugar and pumpkin pie spice; set aside. In a small microwave-safe dish, microwave butter on High about 30 seconds, until melted. Stir in vanilla.

In a large microwaveable bowl, mix all cereals and pecans. Pour butter mixture over cereal mixture, stirring until evenly distributed. Add sugar and spice mixture and stir until coated.

Microwave uncovered on High 5 minutes or until mixture begins to brown, stirring every minute. Spread on wax paper or cookie sheet to cool. Store in an airtight container.

NOTE: I used 7 cups of a mixture of cereals that I had on hand—Corn Chex, Cinnamon Chex and Honey Nut Cheerios; use whatever you may have. The original recipe is from chex.com.

June 3 – Holy Communion "Honoring the Old, Being Open to the New" Mark 2:23-3:6

Mark 2:24 – "The Pharisees said to him, 'Look, why are they doing what is unlawful on the Sabbath?"

Sometimes we'll look at something that someone is suggesting and wonder or say, "Why?" or "We haven't done it that way before."

The religious leaders of Jesus' day were looking upon Jesus and his disciples that way.

Jesus was challenging the way things had been done to bring about new ways — ways that provided the opportunity for God to reach more people.

The healthy church is always in the process of honoring time-tested traditions and searching for new ways of making disciples of Jesus Christ.



June 10 "The Value of a Church Family" Mark 3:30-35

Mark 3:35 – "Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother."

In these verses, Jesus' family arrives and they want to see him.

In our own lives, we might picture Jesus as the public figure, at the venue, ready to address the large crowd gathered to hear him.

Jesus' family feels they should have special access to Jesus so they send someone in to get him. They want him to come out to them, great them, and spend a special moment with them.

The situation set up in these verses is endearing. We can picture ourselves being there. And it's in the midst of this situation that Jesus takes the opportunity to teach an important truth: the value of one's church family.

June 17 "Part of a Larger Whole" Mark 4:26-34

Mark 4:26b-27 – "A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how." With all we do know, there is still much we don't know. I suspect it will always be that way.

Behind all of creation, there is God and "we do not know how" the mind of God works. In our Bible verses today, Jesus taught his disciples about the kingdom of God using everyday stories from their lives (parables).

He taught them that God is ultimately in control. He taught them to advance God's purposes in our own place and with the people around us. He taught them that every person is part of a larger whole.

June 24 "Jesus Still Calms Our Storms" Mark 4:35-41

Mark 4:39b – "'Quiet! Be still!' Then the wind died down and it was completely calm."

This is a universal story, spanning time and space. With the words "there were also other boats," we learn that our boat out on the water — our life — is in this story of the storm at sea.

Sometimes our life gets really hard. It feels like we're in the midst of a furious squall with waves coming over the boat so that we're nearly swamped.

Sometimes we cry out, "God, don't you care if I drown?" (4:38b).

And just as Jesus responded to the disciples, he is asking us, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" (4:40).

We're going to experience more storms in our lives in the future. Some will be raging.

But Jesus reassures us today that we can make it safely through them because "Jesus still calms storms."

Wolfsville Vacation Bible School set for July 9–13, 2018



An update on the situation in Nicaragua. What started out in April as a demonstration against a new Social Security law evolved into large scale protests after more than 40 people (many of them students) were killed.

There have been almost daily marches, mostly peaceful, including a huge one last Wednesday which occurred without any incident and which gave us hope. There have been calls for talks between the different groups but so far they have not taken place.

In the meantime, tensions have risen on all sides and last night more violence broke out. The violence includes vandalism against property and attacks against people. People have been advised to stay home and we are doing that as much as possible. We feel safe in our home.

Please join us in prayer that this situation may be resolved peacefully without further violence and loss of life.

A Tribute to Howard E. Brandenburg — May 18, 1934 - April 21, 2018

Funeral services for Howard E. Brandenburg, 83, were held at Salem on April 26, 2018. Burial was in the Salem Cemetery. The following are excerpts from Pastor Bob Snyder's and Pastor Randy Reid's remarks at the funeral.

Howard Eugene Brandenburg was born on May 18, 1934, in Ringgold. He was the son of the late Evelyn Hays Brandenburg and Roscoe H. Brandenburg. Howard's dad worked for Frick Company, a metal manufacturer. Howard lived the life of a typical boy growing up back then. The lean years of the depression influenced him, as they did many, and he remained frugal throughout his life. Even as a child he was doing his part. At the close of WWII, in 1945, he was awarded a certificate for paper collection to support the war А effort. second certificate of appreciation was by the Automobile Association, awarded to Howard for his work on the Safety Patrol. God gave Howard the gift of helping others and it seems he shared that gift even as a young boy.

When he became old enough, summers were spent working in the orchard fields at Rinehart's and Gardenhour's orchards. He graduated from Smithsburg High School in 1952 and Hagerstown Business College a year later. From 1955-1960, he served as a payroll clerk in the Army and Army Reserves at Hampton Roads, VA.

One Sunday, Howard was in church over in Ringgold. Little did he know at the time that three pews behind him was Betty with her friend Jack. Betty and Jack were just friends and they would go to various church services around the area. On this Sunday, they ended up in Ringgold. Betty noticed Howard sitting those three pews up and she liked what she saw. I asked Betty what the sermon was that night or anything she could remember about the service. She said she didn't have a clue. She couldn't take her eves off Howard.

The next time they met was in church too. Howard was taking the offering and as he came by her row he smiled at her. They started dating, broke up for a bit, but were then back together again, and in about six months they were married right here at Salem. That was 58 years ago.

They moved to the stone home across

the street on the corner of Pleasant Walk and Wolfsville Road right across from Harne's Store. It worked out well for them until they had David and he got old enough to venture out and they were afraid he might get hit by a car. So in 1964, they purchased land and built their home on Martin Road. Marlene remembers playing on the big dirt piles as the house was being built. She was ten.

They took in Betty's mom, who lived with them for 20 years. Stephen came along and it was a full, but happy household. Betty so appreciated the wonderful way Howard treated her mom during those years and it was such a good example to the boys. Once again, Howard's help of others shown through. There were always many picnics and going to the lake and annual reunions and the good things of family life.

Howard loved going to eat at Mountain Gate. As a matter of fact, he loved eating period, wherever it was, especially ice cream. I asked him what his favorite kind was and he answered "ice cream" - any kind would do. Whenever ice cream was being served here at church, you could always see Howard walking around with a spoon in his pocket ready to dig in at a moment's notice.

Howard and Betty were always proud of their boys and supported them in all their activities. He provided for the family working as a bookkeeper at Gladhill Furniture Company for 36 years until he retired in 1999. God gave him the gift of being able to do math fast in his head. Sales clerks would come up to him after working with a customer and list a number of items the customer

wanted to purchase and the price of each and Howard would just add everything up in his head and provide the total without writing anything down.

He was known for going out of his way to treat his customers and fellow employees well. Again, helping others shown through. Howard also worked in sales at Grey Concrete Company, J.C. Penny, and L.Z. Derr Store. When Derr's closed their doors, they presented Howard with a special letter of appreciation which served as a letter of recommendation for Howard.

Something you may not know about him during those working years. He rode a motorcycle.

Something else you may not know. There's a picture around of Howard riding a camel in Arizona; in Sedona. Howard was pretty tall. I'll bet he was really up there when he rode that camel. The ride took place on a Gladhill Furniture company trip that he got to go on.


Howard became known as "Happy Howard" to people who spent time with him. Not happy in a frivolous way -Howard was very responsible - but happy in his spirit, always trying to have a positive attitude and make the best of things.

On this last hospital stay, I met Howard and Stephen as Howard was being transferred from the Emergency Room to a regular hospital room. You could tell he wasn't feeling well. The bed was big and heavy and the nurses were doing their best, but kept running into walls and were having a lot of trouble maneuvering the tight spaces. Howard looked at us and said with that twinkle he'd get in his eye, "women drivers."

A few days later, I visited again and he shared, "I just came back from having a CAT scan." If they'd have asked me beforehand I could have told them and saved us all a lot of money. They seemed surprised when nothing showed up on the scan, I could have told them I didn't have any in me but they were determined to scan me for cats!

infectious, I always left visits with him feeling more positive myself.

Howard adored Betty. Not just by telling her so, but through his actions. Again, his love of the other – in this case his dearest one.

ChristyBeth shares that when Howard was living with them for a while, he'd want to go get his haircut on Saturday morning and ChristyBeth would ask what time he wanted to go and he'd say "I want to go at 6 a.m." "Why 6 a.m? Because then I can get in and out and back to be with Betty."

At Williamsport Retirement Village, he arranged for a lift in the maintenance cart to go up the hill from his building to Betty's, to spend the morning with her. On Saturdays, when the cart wasn't available, he'd ask a staff member to walk up the hill with him.

You and I know couples who we look at and can't imagine one without the other. It's like the two really have become one. Betty and Howard were like that.

When he couldn't be with Betty, he got a lot of joy helping out others in his building. Just doing nice thoughtful things for them. He had a fast walk, and I know it scared the staff sometimes. They didn't want him to fall and hurt himself. But walking fast and helping people gave him purpose, it's what he enjoyed doing.

Something else he did was stay close to God. He'd read his Bible and devotionals and watch the preachers on TV. When Howard and Betty were still physically able, they were in church every Sunday and actively participated in the life and work of the congregation.

Howard served faithfully as a trustee and was a member of the Men's Sunday School Class and supported Betty in her work with the Board of Child Care and the Bee-lievers Women's group. You could count on him as one who showed up to help, and showed up with a cheerful smile.

Along with helping others and his positive attitude, for me, Howard is an example of real courage. It's been said that courage is "grace under pressure." These last few years, Howard has shown a good deal of grace under a lot of "OTHERS"

pressure. In an endearing way, we've spoken about how much Howard enjoyed food, as most of us do.

But two-and-a-half years ago Howard fell and mysteriously couldn't swallow and eat any more. One day he could and the next day, without warning, he couldn't. We held out hope for a good while that his ability to eat would come back. Long hospital stays at Meritus and Hershey Medical Center with gifted doctors trying to figure it out and restore his ability to swallow and eat again, but it wasn't meant to be.

I remember coming to visit him once and out at the front desk there was a big box of donuts and I thought how hard it must be for Howard to have to walk by those donuts and not be able to have one.

But, Howard never allowed his loss of swallowing and eating to break his positive spirit. He remained true to whom God made him to be: helpful to others, always in a cheerful way.

I asked Betty if she could express in a word or phrase what captured who Howard was. She didn't hesitate. She recited, by heart, whole lines from the hymn "Others." Howard was always helping others.

God gave Howard the gift of serving others and he shared his gift with us very well. Well done good and faithful servant.

In addition to honoring God and celebrating Howard's life, today's funeral service also gives us an opportunity to pause and reflect on our own life and our own faith at this time in our lives:

How can we become yet more like Jesus? Live more the way he lived?

Are we continuing to grow as a person and in our faith no matter what our age?

Are we continuing to discover the gifts God has given us and are we serving others through those gifts?

Do we trust in God's power to help us? Are we helping those in need around us and inviting others to Christ and to church?

Howard is experiencing eternal life with Christ, and with his loved ones who have gone on to glory before him. God wants that for all of us. How is our relationship with God at this time in our lives?

Maybe there's something about Howard we've heard about today or know about him through our own personal experience with him. Some way we would like to be more like him.

Let's not miss this chance. By following his example, we will honor his life and he'll live on through us and in the process we'll become a better person.

We give you thanks and praise, Lord, for sharing Howard with us all these years and all that has meant to us. Amen.
