59th annual Lord's Acre Festival is successful despite rainy day

The Lord's Acre Festival is an event that has been blessed by God for 59 years. Our sincere thanks to the Wolfsville community for once again supporting our annual event.

It has been an unusually wet and hot summer; and our hope is always for fair weather on Lord's Acre day, but this year the weather was not ideal, which brought some challenges. In the days leading up to the festival, a weather front stalled over the area bringing rain and lots of it.

On Friday evening, during set up and pie making at the Ruritan Park, heavy downpours measured up to 3 inches in the local area. The rain continued on Saturday, heavy at times.

But, we are blessed to have the large pavilion at the park and other covered areas and tents to keep things dry.

The major challenge with wet weather is parking. Although the large parking lot could not be used, we were able to squeeze everyone into the smaller lot and some peripheral areas. My thanks to those who stood in the rain to help me park cars: Bobby Fogle, Bill Weaver, Tom Marenic, and Mike Irons.

Despite the weather, folks came to eat and purchase the many items for sale. No doubt the rain discouraged some of our friends and neighbors from attending, but, surprisingly, the proceeds at the end of the day were quite positive.

The following morning in church everyone was anxious to know how we did. Before giving the numbers, my thoughts turned to hymns and songs about rain:

"There shall be Showers of Blessing"

Of course, the meaning of rain in this context often refers to the Holy Spirit raining down on us. On Saturday, during the Lord's Acre, the rain was clearly physical but also spiritual. The good Lord was with us ... even in the rain.

Lord's Acre Festival roundup

OUR PURPOSE must always be to present the Lord's Acre Festival in such a way as to glorify God. We pray that we do.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

Fifty-nine years ago, in 1960, Salem's young student pastor, Rev. John Schildt, proposed a fundraising idea to the Salem congregation called Lord's Acre.

A few small country churches in the south were already holding Lord's Acre events to raise money for their ministries.

Farmers set aside an "acre" of land to grow a vegetable crop that could be donated and then sold to benefit the church. Some farmers even raised livestock to donate. Those who did not farm made fancy needlework or craft items to donate.

Salem's first Lord's Acre included fresh and canned produce and fruit, fancy needlework items, food, live music, and an auction of unsold items at the end. The youth fellowship made posters and signs to advertise the event and decorated the old Wolfsville School building with colored leaves, corn shocks, pumpkins, etc.

Forty-eight years ago, in 1970, the event was moved to the Wolfsville Ruritan Park. Being smaller then, everything fit under the large pavilion.

The move to the park, being mostly outside, as opposed to being in the heated schoolhouse, caused the date to be moved from early October to early September.

The first few years at the park, the starting time was 5 p.m.; the same as it had been at the old schoolhouse. As the crowds increased though, and began arriving earlier, it was harder to hold people off from buying earlier, so the start time was moved up to 4 p.m. And with the larger crowds, more parking was provided on the ball field at the park. Prior to that, they parked in the small lot and along the road, and were lined up down the road on both sides.

USE OF LORD'S ACRE PROFITS

We have accomplished a lot since that first Lord's Acre 59 years ago. The profits from this annual event have allowed us to enhance the ministry at Salem and support the Wolfsville community.

Over the years, profits from the Lord's Acre have made possible the



educational building (1967), the parsonage (1974-75), the parking lot and its many improvements and additions (1968, 1993, 1998, and 2007), and many smaller maintenance and improvement projects to our existing buildings and grounds.

During the last 18 years, conditioning was installed in sanctuary; elevator, an handicap restroom, storage rooms, and new flooring were installed; the church steeple was restored; interior and exterior painting was completed; repaired sanctuary floor understructure; repaired and waterproofed classroom walls; renovated the parsonage; purchased new refrigerator and freezer for the kitchen; replaced stucco on sanctuary exterior walls; constructed new concrete floor under the sanctuary; replaced windows in educational building and parsonage; replaced spouting on parsonage; installed central air and additional insulation in the parsonage; updated the sanctuary sound system; replaced kitchen floor in parsonage; and renovated the social hall with new carpet, painted walls, and new window treatment; purchased classroom bulletin boards; replaced microwave and other kitchen items; replaced church phones; installed Wi-Fi Internet access in the church and educational building; installed central air in the social room and church kitchen; and made numerous repairs and improvements.

SUCCESSFUL FUNDRAISER

As of this writing, this year's income totaled \$17,930.05. With some expenses yet to be paid, a full report, indicating the amount of profit, will be published in next month's newsletter. Profits will be placed in Salem's Building and Improvement Fund.



RECIPE



Apple Pound Cake

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 1/2 cups oil
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups flour

- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 2 cups finely chopped, diced, peeled apples

confectioner's sugar

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Mix together oil, sugar, eggs, and vanilla. Beat well.
- Mix together flour, baking soda, and salt. Gradually add to wet ingredients.
- 3. Fold in nuts and apples.
- 4. Pour into greased and floured bundt pan.
- Bake at 325 degrees for 80 minutes. Allow to cool slightly and then remove from pan.
- Sprinkle with confectioner's sugar. Cool completely before cutting. Makes 15-20 servings.

Our sermon series "God's Help in Time of Need" continues in October. We trust the following message topics will be meaningful to you.

October 7 "Comfort in Time of Sorrow" Romans 8:22-26

Romans 8:26 - "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express."

Proverbs 3:5-6 – "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight."


And Romans 1:5 tells us, "If any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to him."
