Country Churches Christmas Tour


Salem will be one of ten congregations participating in this year's Country Churches Christmas Tour on Saturday, December 15, from 1-5 p.m.

The tour is sponsored by the Myersville-Wolfsville Area Historical Society, and features churches from Myersville to Harmony to Wolfsville to Foxville, all decorated for the Christmas season and sharing their history. New to the tour this year will be the old Foxville School, which has been acquired and restored as a community center by Mt. Moriah Lutheran Church. This building was the last two-room school to operate in our area, closing in 1961.

The tour starts at the Myersville Town Hall, where brochures, maps, displays, refreshments and restrooms will be available. Visitors are then able to visit sites in any order they prefer.

Snow date for the tour is Sunday, December 16, at the same times.







CROP Walk successful despite rain

The final pledges have been collected and counted for the 2018 Wolfsville/ Myersville CROP Hunger Walk.

Though the walk was rained out, donors generously supported our effort to reduce hunger.

Together, "would-be" walkers collected \$2,172 for local and international hunger programs.

The funds are sent to Church World Service in Elkhart, IN; in turn, 25% will be distributed locally, divided equally among the Religious Coalition for Human Emergency Needs, the Middletown Food Bank and Salem United Methodist Church Food Pantry.



* * RECIPE **Chocolate Reindeer** INGREDIENTS: 1 cup butter, softened 3 eggs 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa 3 1/4 cups all-purpose flour powder 72 small pretzel twists 2 teaspoons cream of tartar 72 candy-coated milk chocolate 1 teaspoon baking soda pieces 1/2 teaspoon salt 36 small red gum drops DIRECTIONS: 1. In a large mixing bowl beat butter with an electric mixer on medium to high speed for 30 seconds. Add sugar, cocoa powder, cream of tartar, baking soda, and salt. Beat until combined, scraping sides of bowl occasionally. Beat in eggs and vanilla until combined. Beat in as much of the flour as you can with the mixer. Using a wooden spoon, stir in any remaining flour. 2. Divide dough into 6 equal portions. Wrap portions in waxed paper or plastic wrap. Chill for 3 hours or until dough is easy to handle. З. On a lightly floured surface, roll each dough portion into a circle 6 inches in diameter. Using a knife, cut each circle into 6 wedges. Place wedges 2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. For antlers, on each triangle lightly press a pretzel into the upper 4. corners. Press in chocolate pieces for eyes. For a nose, press a red

gumdrop into the dough triangle about 1/2 inch from the point.
Bake in a 375 degree oven for 7 to 9 minutes or until edges are firm. Do not overbake. Cool on cookie sheet for 1 minute. Transfer cookies to a wire rack; cool. Makes 36 cookies.



Message from the Pastor and Worship in December

appy December! During worship the first two Sundays of December, we'll complete our Sermon Series "God's Help in Time of Need."

For the remainder of the month, we'll experience the birth of Jesus through the eyes of Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the angels, and through our own eyes.

Christmas is a time when people really yearn for God's love. You can help a family member or friend experience God's love by bringing them along with you to worship during the month of December. Give someone the greatest Christmas present ever – give them Christ. Have a wonderful Advent and Christmas! God Bless. —*Pastor Bob*

December 2 – Advent 1 Holy Communion "Warning in Time of Indifference" Hebrews 10:26-31

Hebrews 10:30b – "The Lord will judge his people."

One day we will all face God and give an accounting of our lives. Earlier in Hebrews 10, we read, "If we deliberately keep on sinning after we have received the knowledge of the truth, no sacrifice for sins is left, but only a fearful expectation of judgment and of raging fire that will consume the enemies of God" (10:26-27).

Experiencing increasing persecution in the early decades after Jesus' death, Jews who had initially converted to Christianity were now returning to the Jewish faith. They had become indifferent. Returning to the Jewish faith was the easier, safer way. We cannot believe in Jesus and be indifferent to being his disciple. The two are incompatible. Our confession, "I believe" calls for us to strive to live more and more as Jesus lived. God calls upon us to make this response, not to remain indifferent.

December 9 – Advent 2 "Forgiveness in Time of Conviction" 1 John 1:1-10

1 John 1:9 – "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." With the sin of Adam and Eve, every human being is born into sin. Even as we strive to become more and more like Jesus, we continue to stumble and sin. "If we claim to be without sin the truth is not in us" (1:8). The good news is that when we stumble and stray and confess our sin, God forgives us, picks us up, and restores our relationship with him. What we cannot do for ourselves, God does for us!

December 16 – Advent 3 "Mary and Joseph" Luke 1:26-38 Matthew 1:18-25

Luke 1:38 – "Mary answered, 'I am the Lord's servant. May it be to me as you have said." Matthew 1:24 – "When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife."

Regarding Jesus' birth and childhood, both Mary and Joseph were called upon to respond in faith to God who had chosen them. Perhaps we feel that only those who appear in the pages of the Bible or as famous people in history books are chosen to do important things for God. But that's not true. As husbands and wives, parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles, as friends to others, in workplaces and on the playing fields, as family members in our local churches, we are all chosen by God to play an important role in his human family.

December 23 – Advent 4 "The Angels and Shepherds" Luke 2:8-15

Luke 2:8-9 – "And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified." Luke 2:10-11 – "But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you, he is Christ the Lord.""

The shepherds were on the lowest rung of the social ladder yet God chose them to be the first to visit Jesus. They were terrified at first, but God sent his messengers to calm them and give them the courage to act. Who are you in this story? A messenger for God? In need of a messenger from God? What is our deepest desire this Christmas?

December 24 – Christmas Eve Worship at Salem, 7 p.m.

Worship includes prayer, the Bible story of Christ's birth, children's live manger scene, Christmas hymns, children's choir, children reciting Christmas poems, and the adult choir performing "He's Still the King of Kings." We'll end by singing "Silent Night" by candlelight. All are welcome!

December 30 First Sunday after Christmas "All Who Heard" Luke 2:16-20

Luke 2:17 - "When they [the shepherds] had seen him [baby Jesus], they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them." We normally think of the main characters on the day of Jesus' birth to be Mary and Joseph, baby Jesus, the angels and the shepherds, and the wise men (who may have arrived a few days later). But verse 17 tells us that after visiting Jesus at the manger, the shepherds spread the word, and "all who heard" were amazed. Aren't we part of "all who heard"? I can imagine some in this group running to the stable to see Jesus for themselves! This Christmas Season we have the opportunity to run to Jesus, praise and give thanks to him, receive the love he offers us, and commit in 2019 to share Christ's love with others.

1819-2019 History *of* Salem United Methodist Church Part 1 — Roots in the Past

The Heritage of Salem

Mention the heritage of Salem United Methodist Church in Wolfsville and what is the first thing you think of? How many of you thought of the Hoover house and barn?

While these structures do play an important part in our history and are two of the few remaining evidences of our roots, have you ever wondered about the people behind our congregation— the ones who brought it into being, who nurtured it, who ministered to it?

Have you ever wondered why we started as United Brethren in Christ? Why our cemetery is located where it is?

Our church will be celebrating its bicentennial in 2019. Each month in the coming year, *The Mountain Shepherd* will include an article about our history and some of the people involved in its ministry in the Wolfsville area.

This article sets the stage for those stories to answer some of the questions above.

The Hoover Family

No discussion of Salem's story is possible without a discussion of the Hoover family.

Their story is pieced together from a variety of sources which do not always agree on dates and places, due to the lack of early records.

This version is the most logical.

Johannes Huber (John Hoover Sr.) Arrived in America in 1732

Johannes Huber was the first in the family to live in America.

Immigration records from the 1700's list several men by this name entering the port of Philadelphia on various ships in various years.

The man with connections to Wolfsville, per family tradition, migrated from his birthplace in Canton Bern, Switzerland, to the Palatinate area of Germany to escape religious persecution.

On September 30, 1732, he arrived in America. Landing in Philadelphia, he moved first to Lancaster County, then York County, and finally to Frederick County, Maryland. The area where he settled is now part of Washington County.

Despite some claims otherwise, the late president Herbert Hoover is not descended from this Johannes Huber, or the English variation "John Hoover".

Genealogist tracings and DNA testing have confirmed that the local Hoovers are not related to the late president.

Marriage of Johannes & Mary: First Mennonites to settle around Ringgold, Maryland

Johannes Huber married Mary Watson, and they became the first Mennonites to settle around Ringgold, in Washington County.

Their children included Henry born about 1748, married Anna Wertz; John born 1753, married Susan Stouffer; Ulrich born 1755, Anna Maria born 1759, married Jacob Welty; Mary married Matthias Hoffman; Elizabeth married Michael Sprenkle; Christianna married John Wertz; Christopher married Hester (maiden name unknown); Susannah married George Mentzer.

These children married into other Mennonite families of the area and the names are still familiar ones in the area between Ringgold, Maryland and Waynesboro, Pennsylvania.

Johannes died in 1804, and was buried in the Hoover family cemetery on their farm "Necessity" along with Mary, who had predeceased him. The cemetery is located in a field in the area of Rinehart Road and Watery Lane.

Land Transactions Between 1769 and 1800

Johannes Huber, or John Hoover, Sr., made at least 10 land transactions in Frederick County and 17 in Washington County between May 30, 1769 and 1800.

He signed his deeds and his will with his mark, indicating he could not write.

The transaction of interest to Salem

is this: August 15, 1799- John Hoover, Sr. of Washington County for 700 pounds sells to John Hoover Jr., of Frederick County the 291acre tract of land "whereon the said John Hoover, Jr. now dwells," part of a tract called "Egypt" which the Lord Proprietor of the late Province of Maryland granted to Daniel Arnold and said Arnold some time after sold to Christian Stover, and said Stover by his deed of March 15, 1785 sold to John Hoover, Sr.

Christian Stover, or Stouffer, was the father-in-law of John Hoover, Jr.

John Hoover Jr. acquires land in the Wolfsville area

The 291 acres transferred to John Hoover, Jr. are located in the Wolfsville area, including the farm across from the Wolfsville Ruritan Park and south to Stottlemyer Road.

This is where John Hoover, Jr. and wife Susan Stouffer settled and raised their family. They lived in a house on the property, probably built in 1754 by Daniel Arnold, near the large stone house that now stands near the corner of Brandenburg Hollow and Stottlemyer Roads. This first house is no longer standing.

Shortly before John and Susan died, they built a two-story stone house nearby; all that remains of this home is the bottom story, which was converted to a garage.

John Hoover, Jr. acquired vast tracts of land in the Wolfsville area. His will, written in 1822, gives a total of 763 acres to his three sons, John, Jacob and Christian. The will also makes no mention of Susan, so apparently she had already died.

John Hoover Jr. and son John helped establish Salem

John Hoover, Jr. and his son John are the ones who became part of the United Brethren in Christ denomination, and became instrumental in the establishment of Salem.
